SCHOOL NOTES

High School Manual Training

Freshmen—Upper Division.
The freshmen of the upper division are at work on myrtle wood library tables. They drew their plans, figured out the necessary lumber, purchased it and are already well into their problem.

Freshmen—Lower Division

The freshmen of the lower division are doing joinery preparatory to the cabinet making and furniture construction of the latter part of the year. They have been constructing drawing boards and T squares for their work in mechanical drawing. Their drawing instruments arrived last week and they will soon begin the work in mechanical drawing.

Sophomores

The sophomores have undertaken some construction work for the school. Each boy is to complete a bench this year. At present they have the drawings and plans completed. These benches will be a start in the direction of some much needed equipment for mechanical drawing. At present facilities for this work are limited; students have to do their drawing work in the shop and this presents difficulties.

Advanced Class

The advanced class has also undertaken something for the school in the form of a piano bench. It is to be made of quarter sawed oak and will be stained to match the piano. There are several turning exercises involved in its construction which have been closely correlated with the outlined course in wood turning. The boys are mastering the characteristic strokes in the handling of the tools and will soon be ready to start work on the bench.

Band Ball at M. H. S.

The game of hand ball has been started in the high school and a great deal of interest is being shown in it. All classes are taking it up, and for a game in which quickness and accuracy are essential, it is one of the best—combining those essentials with exercise which is not too violent. A tournament was started this week and each class of the High School has several representatives. The freshmen and sophomores have played off their first series of games, McCarberry winning in the freshmen; Kramer, Watkins, Shultzpeiz, and Glosper in the Sophomores.
