EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 20.—In the first quarter of the game between the Oregon Agricultural College and the University of Oregon teams the famous Oregon "Jinx" appeared after fourteen minutes of play when Teger blocked Cole's punt from behind the line and scored the first touchdown. CHINESE ARRESTED

ALLEGED SMUGGLING AT SAN FRANCISCO CHARGED

As a Result Sweeping Investigation of Coast Federal Immigration Has Been Started

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 20.—A sweeping investigation of the federal immigration service on the Pacific Coast has been instituted on the authority of the Secretary of Commerce and the Secretary of Labor, according to the statement of Assistant Secretary of Labor Densmore, made public here today. Densmore is in personal charge of the inquiry, which is said to be the direct result of the arrest of 86 Chinese brought to this port on the last voyage of the steamer Mongolia with the alleged intention of smuggling them ashore.

ASKS CONFERENCE

PRESIDENT WANTS TO MEET REPUBLICAN CONGRESS LEADERS

Would Discuss With Representative Mahn and Senator Gallinger National Defense Plan

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 20.—President Wilson today asked Senator Gallinger and Representative Mann, republican leaders in the senate and the house respectively, to confer with him before opening congress on the legislation for national defense.

The time of the conference will be arranged to suit the two leaders. The President sent invitations in accordance with the announcement plan making the fight for military preparedness along non-partisan lines.

NOT A GERMAN BOAT

SUBMARINE WHICH SANK THE ANCONA WAS AUSTRIAN

Italian Government Sends Word That It Has Reason to Believe Such Is True

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 20.—The Italian foreign office notified American Ambassador Page at Rome that it had reason to believe the submarine which sank the Ancona was Austrian. This, with the Austrian government's acknowledgement of the act, clears up the last possibility that it might have been a German boat.

FORM NEW LEAGUE

ORGANIZE THE WORLD LEAGUE OF AMERICA

Purpose Is to Settle All Differences of the Countries by Judicial Process

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—Announcement was made today of the formation here yesterday of the World Court League of America, which has for an object the establishment of an international court composed of representatives of every country in the world to decide all international differences by judicial process. Former President Taft is honorary president. The first meeting will be held in Louisville in February.

STRANGE CASE ENDS

HOBBO BURIED AT CHICAGO WITH MUCH CEREMONY

Body Had Served As Hero of Morbid Fancy of Young Atlanta Woman

CHICAGO, Nov. 20.—The body of the unidentified hobo, which served for a time as the hero of an Atlanta girl's morbid fancy, was buried with ceremony here today. Over the body a sermon preaching charity to the unfortunates of the world, was delivered at the Cathedral of Saints Peter and Paul. From the casket the name of "Dr. Alleyne Hensley," bestowed on the phantom lover by Miss Julia Crumley, of Atlanta, was erased and there was no other name to take its place.

DISCOVER MURDER

BODY FOUND IN TRUNK IN WILLAMETTE RIVER

Stranger Kills His Room Mate in Place Where They Secured Lodgings

PORTLAND, Nov. 20.—A large, light complexioned man with a double chin murdered his room mate whose body was found in a trunk floating in the Willamette river here last night, according to evidence in the hands of the police.

The man rented a room in a lodging house Monday. They told the landlady they came from San Francisco. The identity of neither the alleged murderer nor his victim was discovered.

According to the landlady, the large man had an expressman come to the door late yesterday and helped him carry the trunk containing the body down to a wagon. In the room where the murder occurred, the bed, walls and floor are spattered with blood.

STILL HUNT BODIES

FOURTEEN ARE YET UNCOVERED FROM MINE

Two Bodies Were Taken Out Today From Ruins of Ravensdale, Wash., Workings

SEATTLE, Nov. 20.—The bodies of two more miners, Joseph Baldacci and Romeo Medaine, were recovered from the wrecked Ravensdale mine of the Northwestern Improvement Company today, bringing the number of dead found to 17 and leaving 14 still in the mine. The debris in the mine is being rapidly cleared away.

MONASTIR HAS BEEN CAPTURED

That is Report Received and is Admitted in London as Probably True

ALLIES TOO LATE

Troops Not Able to Aid Serbians and Situations Has Grown Much Worse

Activities There Have Been Checked It is Believed—Italians and Austrians are Fighting Desperately—Artillery Dues in West

LONDON, Nov. 20.—A wireless message to Sayville from Berlin today announces that 2500 more Serbians were captured. Although no official confirmation was received of the report that the Bulgarians captured Monastir in Southwestern Serbia, little hope is felt that the announcement is premature.

ALLIES TOO LATE

Accepting it as true, the impression is growing that the entente allies arrived too late and in too small numbers to give any service to the Serbians. The only thing that is certain is that Serbia's military situation is growing from bad to worse. In the north the main Serbian armies are being dispersed and captured by the Austro-German battering ram, which probably would move more rapidly if weather conditions were better. Bulgarians hold most of Southern Serbia.

MAKING NO PROGRESS

The Anglo-French armies based on Saloniki seem to do no better than hold their positions. Optimistic feeling in regard to the diplomatic situation in Greece still persists in England. The reasons for this optimism, however, continue obscure.

WEATHER IS BAD

The weather seems to have intervened again in Russia. Little activity is reported except the retirement of the Russians back of the Sty River in Galicia. In Courland wet weather brought both sides to a standstill.

ITALIANS FIGHTING

Desperate fighting continues between the Austrians and the Italians. Rome says the Austrian air raid on Udine resulted in the death of 12 and wounding 27 persons. In the air attack of Verona, four persons were injured. In the west, artillery duels continue.

KITCHENER RECEIVED BY THE GREEK KING

ATHENS, Nov. 20.—Field Marshal Kitchener arrived at Athens today. He and the British Minister were received this afternoon by King Constantine.

CITIES OCCUPIED

BERLIN REPORTS FURTHER VICTORIES IN SERBIA

Motitors Bombard Westende, Belgium But Are Driven Away by the German Guns

BERLIN, Nov. 20. (Wireless to Sayville)—The occupation of Nova Vares and Stenica in western Serbia near the Montenegrin border is reported in an official statement today. Toward the center of the Teuton advance, the town of Itaska, 12 miles northeast of Novi Pazar, has been reached.

BOMBARD WESTENDE

Today's statement also reports the bombardment of Westende, Belgium, by hostile monitors which withdrew when they were repelled by the German batteries on the coast.

VOLCANO ERUPTS

PASSENGERS FROM LIPARI ISLANDS TELL OF FLIGHT

Stromboli Sends Out Streams of Flaming Lava Which Flows Into the Ocean

CATANIA, Sicily, Nov. 20.—Passengers on steamships arriving from the Lipari Islands report that the eruption of the Stromboli volcano is increasing in violence. They describe the spectacle as awe inspiring, particularly at night, when streams of flaming lava, flowing from the crater into the sea, are visible for miles away.

SHAH WILL REMAIN

RULER OF PERSIA NOT TO LEAVE HIS CAPITAL

Decision is Result of Adjustment of Questions Between Russia and Persia

TEHERAN, Persia, Nov. 20.—A proclamation issued by the government today confirmed the official announcement that the Shah had decided not to leave Teheran, owing to an adjustment of the questions between Russia and Persia.

FOG SAVES VERONA FROM SUBMARINE

MADRID, Nov. 20.—A latter wireless message from the Verona states that she has eluded the submarine in a fog.

CORN SHOW DRAWS

MANY FARMERS IN ATTENDANCE TODAY AT COQUILLE

Husking Bee and Barn Dance This Evening—Interest Centers Around Awarding of Prize

COQUILLE, Nov. 20.—All business was closed here this afternoon that every one might have a chance to attend the Coquille Corn Show. There are many visitors here from the surrounding farms. At noon a big basket dinner was given in the W. O. W. Hall and this afternoon the races and contests are on.

Prof. J. E. Larson, of O. A. C. this afternoon lectured to the farmers on the cultivation and raising of corn, illustrating his points with the various exhibits of corn on show in Hazlet Hall.

This evening there will be an old fashioned husking bee and a barn dance as a final wind up of the show. The prizes for the best corn in the various classes will be announced late this afternoon. Considerable interest centers around the awarding of a Wisconsin silo as the grand prize.

LINER PURSUED BY SUBMARINE

Steamer Verona in Danger of Being Sunk in Mediterranean Messages State

SAILED SECRETLY

Owned by Same Italian Company That Operated the Ancona Recently Destroyed

STEAMER ALSO FOLLOWING

Submarine is Said in Message to be a Large One With Two Periscopes Vessel Thought to be Bound For New York City

MADRID, Nov. 20.—A telegram received here today gives a wireless message, said to have been sent out by the Italian liner Verona, stating that she was being pursued in the Mediterranean by a large submarine with two periscopes.

STEAMER ALSO FOLLOWING

According to the telegram, the submarine is accompanied by a steamer. The position of the Verona is given as latitude 40, longitude 6, off Cape Palos.

Sailing Not Reported

The Verona is 8261 tons gross and is owned by the Italia Societa Di Navigazione, which also owned the Ancona. She was scheduled to leave Palermo Nov 11 for New York but no word of her sailing has been received.

FORGERY CHARGED

AMOS LEWELLEN OF MYRTLE POINT IN TROUBLE

Is Only Seventeen and Formerly Had Good Reputation—Says He Needed Clothing

ROSEBURG, Nov. 20.—Amos Lewellen, aged 17 years and a Myrtle Point boy, is under arrest at Roseburg on a charge of forgery. It is said that he has confessed his guilt and may plead guilty. He was arrested at Harrisburg after the officers had been searching over the state for him. A letter to a friend at Myrtle Point led to his apprehension. It is alleged that he passed a \$17 worthless check on D. J. Jarvis.

It is claimed that Lewellen has never before been in trouble and because of his youthfulness it is thought he may be shown leniency.

The lad lives at Myrtle Point, and prior to his present trouble is said to have borne a good reputation. When asked why he passed the worthless check on Mr. Jarvis, the youth said he was in need of clothes and had been unable to obtain employment. On account of the fact that the city jail at Harrisburg was undergoing repairs, the prisoner was housed at a hotel there pending the arrival of the deputy sheriff from Roseburg. When arrested Lewellen had but a few cents in his pocket.

Finally Arrested

A Roseburg paper tells of the case as follows: "Deputy Sheriff T. A. Raffety left from Harrisburg from where he will return with A. L. Lewellynn, who was captured and is wanted in this city on the charge of passing a forged check on D. J. Jarvis, the water front merchant.

"Lewellynn came to this city on the 8th of the month and after making a small purchase at Mr. Jarvis' clothing store presented a check for \$28.50, the check being made payable to A. A. Cuverson and signed by A. W. Johnson. Upon being presented at the bank it was found that the check was a forgery and the officers immediately notified.

"The authorities all over the state were ordered to arrest him if possible, but he was not found until yesterday afternoon when he was located at Harrisburg. His arrest was the result of a card mailed to a friend at Myrtle Point, which bore the postmark from Harrisburg and which was turned over to the officers by the person receiving it. Mr. Raffety will probably return with his prisoner tonight.
