MUST MAIL EARLY

POSTMASTER HUGH McLAIN ISSUES INSTRUCTIONS

Tomorrow is Holiday and No Deliveries To Be Made—Mail Windows Open Between 11 and 12 a. m.

Tomorrow being a legal holiday the postoffice will be open only between 11 and 12 a. m. and there will be no deliveries of mail in the city, according to the announcement of Postmaster Hugh McLain.

Christmas Mail Special warning is being given relative to the Christmas mail. Because of the boat schedules the steamships bringing in the parcels post and also carrying it out will be here several days previous to Christmas.

For this reason instructions are given to bring packages early to the postoffice and not to wait until the day of sailing or even the day before that as there will be a great rush.

Wrap Securely Postmaster Hugh McLain asks that the persons sending packages away tie them up very securely and also have the names and addresses on them plainly legible.

There will be extra carriers put on probably to handle the parcels post, all of which will be delivered in plenty of time before Christmas. And so the slogan is "Mail Early, Wrap Securely and Address Plainly."
