BURIED IN SANDS

CORONER AND UNDERTAKER CARE FOR UNKNOWN BODY

Dig Shallow Hole on Beach With Sticks and Another Supposed Victim of Santa Clara Buried

On the beach amid the driftwood and almost in the very spot where it was found the body of an unknown man was buried late yesterday afternoon. There were no services. A shallow grave, hastily dug in the sand with sticks, and into this the body was rolled.

Justice C. L. Penneck, who acted as coroner, and Mr. Moon, of the Wilson Undertaking Parlor, were called to the scene. The verdict was that the man was probably one of the three missing men of the Santa Clara's crew and that he came to his death by accidental drowning.

It was said that the trunk was that of a good-sized man, though there was absolutely nothing about it to be a means of identification.

One letter came this morning from a widow near Myrtle Point. She is a cripple and has two children. "Please hurry," runs the plaintive appeal. "There is nothing in the house to eat." These appeals will be taken before the county court tomorrow to see what can be done to relieve the suffering.

Horse Runs Away—Becoming frightened while the driver was away from the wagon, a horse of the Coos Bay laundry, hitched to their delivery wagon, ran away at noon today and crashed through the guard railing on south Fourth street near the intersection of Curtis. The wagon was overturned in the fall, though the horse was uninjured. A few weeks ago the animal ran away from the laundry and came near running of the dock at the foot of Commercial avenue, being caught very close to the edge by a bystander. The damage to the wagon today was slight.

Machines Collide—Two machines of the Bunker Hill Jitney line, belonging to Walter Richardson, were damaged on Broadway yesterday afternoon. The two autos had started south, one behind the other when the lead machine turned directly in front of the other, so as to avoid an oncoming wagon. At the same time the front auto started to slow down to let a passenger alight and the Jitney from the rear, collided with it. The latter machine lost a light, a spring was broken and the fender damaged as well as a tire lost. The damage amounts to about \$75.
