Find More Children.—The first census report showed a total of 764 children for the Marshfield district. Since that time the records have been gone over very carefully and now the list has been brought up to 823 pupils of school age and it is expected that before the year is out the list will be brought up to 850 at least. Every new name added to the list means eight more dollars added to the school fund.

Still Big Crowds.—Harry J. McKeown said that in spite of the fact the San Francisco Exposition was within a very few days of its close when he left there, great crowds every day thronged the grounds. None of the concessions were being taken down, the directors evidently having a rule that nothing could be touched until December 6. Mr. McKeown said the weather was very enjoyable the whole time they were there, with one or two days of light mist, that was all.

Little Mail to Europe.—The local postal clerks say that little mail has gone this season to Europe in celebration of the happy Yuletide and they even go so far as to express the belief that there will be no Christmas or Santa Claus across the water. Packages for the old country, in order to have reached there on time, should have been sent on the last trip north of the Kilburn. It takes approximately 16 days from Portland to Europe, under the best of conditions, and with the boats now sailing on irregular schedules, it will possibly take more time than this.
