### SCHOOL NOTES

The High school lunch serves about fifty pupils daily. The practice of bringing solid foods from home and buying soup or drink at the school is increasing.

Eleven more framed pictures have been added to the school's art list.

Dean Straub commented favorably on the work of Marshfield High School students in the University of Oregon.

Horizontal bar, traveling rings, and swinging rings have been added to the equipment of the gymnasium. Miss Estrele Nilund of the Commercial Department is acting as book-keeper for the "High School Lunch."

Miss Clara Sargeant, '15 and a former student in the Department of Domestic Science, is in general charge of the High school lunch.

Boxing and wrestling are becoming popular sports with the high school boys. The school has some mighty good young wrestlers—among those interested are: Tribby, Glossop, Painter, Watters, Schutzeis, Merchant.

The business-like management of the finances of the High School Athletic Association by its treasurer, Jack Merchant, is productive of much favorable comment.

The lunch table in the kitchen is the work of the manual training department. Other school projects under way in this department are: piano bench, hall tree and music cabinet for the Ladies' rest room, bicycle and motor cycle shed for the high school building. It will be necessary to provide housing room for approximately forty wheels. The project may be given to the seventh grade for a class project.

The High school class in art is making some friezes for the primary rooms of the school. All designs are original with members of the class though helped with suggestions and criticisms by the instructors.

The department of art will have a Christmas sale of calendars, book plates, etc. designed and hand colored by the students of the school.
