In regard to adjusting the current expenses of the city of Marshfield under the changed and peculiar conditions which have arisen — and which we are bound to face squarely during the next two years, I intend, if I am elected, to do all in my power to LOWER and REDUCE the running expenses and keep them within reason.

According to Mr. Evertsen's appeal the question of supporting the band, of building a city hall and of the twenty mill levy will come before the council after the first of the year for adjustment. In this Mr. Evertsen is mistaken. The question of supporting the band and building a city hall will be "adjusted" by the voters next Tuesday. As to the twenty mill tax levy that has been definitely fixed and will not again be before the council. The only time you will hear from this again will be when you are asked to dig down into your jeans for the amount.

Mr. Evertsen says: "My one object as mayor of Marshfield will be to PRACTICE ECONOMY." I trust he will not think me impertinent if I ask why this has not been his "one object" during the past year as councilman. He has known all through the year of the "changed and peculiar conditions which have arisen" yet he has not supported the finance committee in their efforts to reduce expenses and get ready for these "changed and peculiar conditions". Conditions would have been less "changed and peculiar" had this economy idea taken hold of Councilman Evertsen at the time he was voting to pay out \$99.99 each week from a depleted treasury. This economy idea has had a very rapid growth with our friend, almost equal to that of Jonah's gourd.

## MAKE COUNTY DRY

LOCAL DRUGGISTS FAVOR CLAMPING LID DOWN

Opinion of Members is They Will Not Take Out Federal Liquor Licenses for Next Year

Water, water, everywhere and not a drop of alcohol even to rub one's tired back or lame feet in 1916 is the edict of the Coos County Pharmaceutical Association, which held its quarterly meeting last evening in North Bend. In a short discussion the druggists expressed the opinion that they should not even take out a federal liquor license for next year.

Such action would mean that alcohol could not be purchased at any drug store in the county, not for any purpose. Neither could whiskey be bought for medical purposes.

### Free Selves of Suspicion

In short talks several of the druggists stated that they do not wish the odium that would attach to them, if during dry times, they sold alcohol in any form. The opinion was expressed that in the past drug stores have been severely criticized and some, too, have sold the liquor on the side and in 1916 the criticism would be increased ten fold and more, and therefore steps should be taken to clear their skirts by refusing to take out federal liquor licenses.

It is possible that a special meeting of the Association will be called later to discuss the prohibition question, there being too short a time last evening for a thorough consideration of the problem.

### Favor Stevens Bill

Unanimously the members voted in favor of writing the Oregon senators and representatives in Congress to vote in favor of the Stevens Bill which stands for standard prices, and which is being fought by the big businesses that have stores in various cities and cut prices.

Prices of drugs have fluctuated up and down on account of the war. The members last night set a present standard price for such articles as glycerine, quinine and carbolic acid, all of which have gone up several times over their former prices.

### Try to Lower Prices

The action of the druggists was rather to lower prices than to advance them.

Myrtle Point was selected for the next quarterly meeting of the Association in February. The members present last evening were, William H. Furnley, of Myrtle Point; R. S. Knowlton and C. O. Fuhrman, of Coquille; W. S. Wells and C. Y. Lowe, of Bandon; M. E. Everitt, L. G. Platt and Mr. Eaton, of North Bend; and Frank D. Cohan, J. Lee Brown, Harry Winkler, Frank Birch and Frank Parsons, of Marshfield.

**DALLAS**—Eurglars entered the general store of N. Selig and attempted to dynamite the safe.

**ASTORIA**—C. L. Houston was awarded the contract for the \$60,000 grain elevator which is to be erected at the municipal wharf.

**PENDELTON**—Three women die of pneumonia in the city during the space of twenty-four hours.

**LAPINE**—Dan Angland, one of Oregon's most prominent sheep men, who was stabled in a saloon at Paisley on Thanksgiving night, is dead and Jim O'Keefe another big sheep man is held in jail on a charge of murder.

**HUNTINGTON**—Mrs. J. N. Harris an early settler of Snake River Valley, died at her home.

**OREGON CITY**—Thomas P. Randall has been appointed receiver for the Northwestern Association, a concern which has been selling orchard land in the east.
