The allies advance in Flanders and the Germans evacuate Vernelles.

King Nicholas of Montenegro announces that a third of his army has perished and that he is in need of money.

DEC. 7, 1914

The Germans defeat strong Russian forces to the northwest and southwest of Lodz.

It is estimated that the Germans lost 100,000 men in the month's fighting at Lodz.

The Serbian troops in command of King Peter check the Austrian advance.

The Germans rush the building of Zeppelins for making air raids on England.

Queen Elizabeth of Belgium and the sister of King Albert join in a message of thanks to the American people for giving aid to the Belgians.

G. A. SLACKE, LUMBERMAN, GIVES ENCOURAGING NEWS

Say Coos Bay All Right, But That We Must Get a Terminal Freight Rate

G. A. Slacke, representative of Beedle Bros., big dealers of lumber in San Francisco, is on Coos Bay making a business visit. This is the first time that he has been here and he is looking over the situation and will visit the different mills.

Cause of Improvement When asked to just what he attributed the raise in prices, he said: "The people in the grain countries have had good crops and this has given them a general prosperity."

When asked what effect the close of the war would have, Mr. Slacke admitted that it would mean a boom for the Pacific Coast lumber business if the European war was brought to a close.

Look for Peace Soon "And it seems to be the general opinion in business circles generally that the war will not last much after next spring."

Must Have Good Rate Mr. Slacke said he was quite well impressed with the Coos Bay country and was much interested in looking it over. He said he thought the completion of the railroad would be of great benefit.

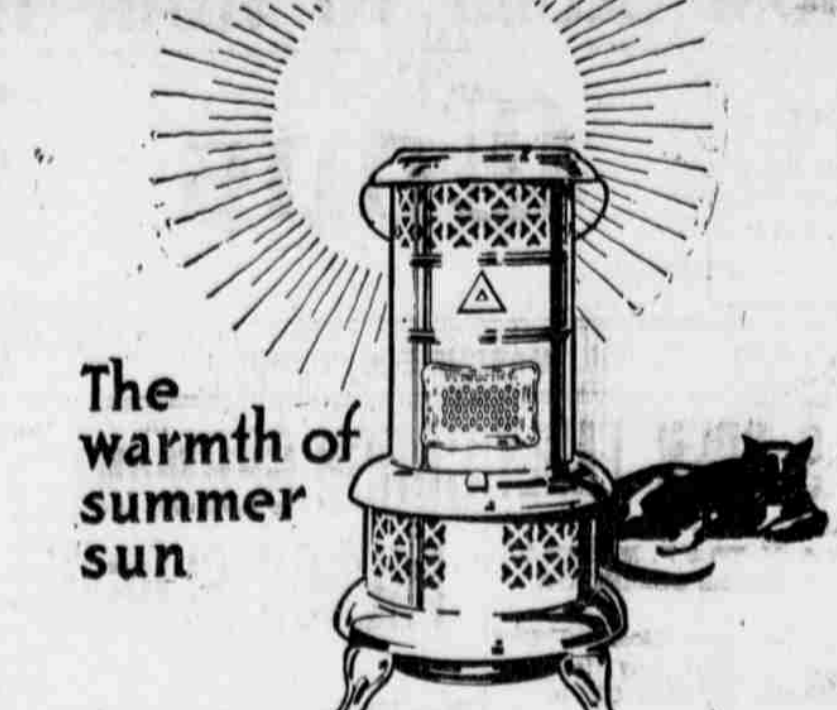
