## PLACES TO FILL

### MAYOR COPPLE WILL MAKE MANY APPOINTMENTS

Much Speculation as to City Offices to be Filled—No Announcements Made by Him Yet

There was much gossip and speculation today as to the probable appointment of R. A. Copple when he assumes the mayor's chair next January. Mr. Copple said today he had lots of time to think it over and laughed when told of some of the rumors.

He will have the appointment of city attorney, city engineer, city health officer and treasurer among others.

One report last night was that Chas. Doane, now merchant policeman, might be named Marshal in place of Jack Carter. Another had it that L. W. Traver would be chosen. Some thought that Marshal Carter would be retained and anyway it is a safe bet that he will remain on the police force. Mayor Copple will also have the appointment of the two police officers and his friends intimated that there might be a change in the force.

Whether Mr. Copple will retain Dr. Straw as city health officer, owing to the old political clash between them and that Dr. Straw was supporting Evertsen was another question.

It was intimated before the election that if Copple won out, he would name a city treasurer who is not identified with any of the banks.

E. Bandel was also talked of today as a likely selection for Copple's place on the council.

However it is not likely that he will announce his appointments for some time. His appointments are subject to confirmation by the city council.

## QUESTION RAISED

### TWO EASTSIDE OFFICE HOLDERS ARE NOW IN DOUBT

City Attorney Watkins Reserves Opinion—Claim Mrs. Wright's Husband Not Yet Naturalized

Now that Eastside has held an election, questions as to the legal right of some of the successful candidates to hold office pops up, and City Attorney George Watkins is delving deep into the heart of law books to get at the meat of the matter.

There was complaint today that W. H. Cavanaugh is a mail carrier, and as an employee of Uncle Sam cannot hold a seat on the city council. In an off hand opinion Mr. Watkins expressed the belief that Cavanaugh is within his rights, but will give his decision later.

Also it is said that the husband of Mrs. Ben Wright, elected to the council, is not a naturalized citizen, and therefore she has no right to vote or to hold office. It is a coincidence that only today should be received from Washington a Supreme Court decision on this matter, holding that an American woman, married to a foreigner, is an alien.
