Unfavorable weather influences the operations of the Germans in Poland where they start retreating from a drive on Warsaw.

The Sultan of Turkey announces he was forced to declare war when the Russian fleet attacked his boats. The Germans gain a foothold at Steinback, Alsace.

DECEMBER 13, 1914

The German cruiser Cormorant arrived at Guam and was given 24 hours in which to leave or be interned.

Belgrade is reported falling before the advance of the Serbians who are attempting to recapture it.

Fighting in northern France is recommenced and the Allies claim some gains.

GOOD TIMES

THE war orders were simply the key to prosperity. The war might cease tomorrow and business would feel only a temporary disturbance while conditions were being readjusted.

From the Rocky Mountains to the eastern seaboard comes news of industrial activity. There are even complaints that the times are too good. There are not enough freight cars to handle the material offered to the railroads. Premiums must be paid for the early delivery of steel. Agents rush about from one mill to another begging, pleading, for mill products.

A few weeks ago, business men were in doubt as to the quality of the boom. They feared it was merely an affair of months to come to an end when the war did. But that doubt is gone now. The prosperity is the real thing, the restoration of confidence is permanent.

NEWS OF OREGON

GLENDALE—Miss Catherine Clark who had the distinction of being the first woman in Oregon elected to the state senate, has announced that she will not again be a candidate and will retire from politics, preferring a private life.

SALEM—Edward H. Martin, who was serving a fifteen year sentence in the penitentiary for the murder of Nathan Wolfe, a pawnbroker in Portland in 1908, has been paroled by Governor Withycombe and will go to New York where his father resides.

PORTLAND—John Hazell, president of the Northwest Association of Oregon City, a concern which has been selling orchard tracts, has been arrested on a charge of using the mails to defraud, it being alleged that the company had misrepresented.

ROSEBURG—The board of fire commissioners has fixed a new fire limit for the city, one district allowing the erection of brick, stone or concrete buildings only and another district allowing the use of metal lath or stucco class buildings.

ASTORIA—Capt. Randall Rogers, a San Francisco pilot, was fined \$50 for taking a boat over the bar without a state branch license, but the fine was suspended.

WHEELER—Will Barker, son of a rancher, while hunting ducks, had his hand accidentally shot off.

HILLSBORO—George T. Ledford, a pioneer of 1854 and a native of North Carolina, died as the result of a stroke of paralysis.

OREGON CITY—Oscar Johnson, Alfred Wall and Jack Bolstrom were put on trial for giving liquor to three minors.

To the Editor of Coos Bay Times:

The attention of this office has been called to the acts of certain persons, who call themselves "lawyers," but unfortunately, are scavengers in an honorable profession, which would have less to apologize for if such persons were expelled from the list and compelled to something in return for the unmerited protection they receive from the community which patiently suffers their presence.

It is reported to this office that persons above described are offering to children and their parents or guardians, as the case may be, "age and schooling certificates" and to secure the approval of the same by this office, and charge for such services the sum of two dollars and fifty cents. The taking of this sum for the purposes named is graft pure and simple, and more than the person making the charge is worth, with hide and tallow thrown in.

The law which governs in such cases is as follows:

"Section 7. An age and schooling certificate shall be executed, issued and approved only by the Secretary of the Board of Inspection of Child Labor, or by a person authorized by him or her in writing; provided, that no person authorized as aforesaid shall have authority to approve such certificate for any child in or about to enter his own employment, or the employment of a firm or corporation of which he is a member, officer or employee. The person approving the certificate shall have authority to administer the oath provided for therein, but no fees shall be charged therefor, but in case of the loss of such certificate a certified copy may be furnished, for which a fee of fifty cents may be charged."

PROCLAMATION

To the People of the City of Marshfield:

I, F. E. Allen, Mayor of the City of Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon, do hereby proclaim and declare that Ordinance No. 726 of said City of Marshfield, entitled "An Ordinance directing that the question of amending certain portions of the Charter of the City of Marshfield, enacted at the 23rd Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, in regular session for the year 1905, filed in the office of the Secretary of State February 18th, 1915, and as subsequently amended by the people of the City of Marshfield, be submitted to the legal voters of the City of Marshfield, at the next regular city election" referred to the people of said City and voted upon by them at the regular City Election of said City on the 7th day of December, 1915, held pursuant to the order of said Common Council, was duly approved by the majority of those voting at said election, that 410 votes were cast at said City Election in favor of said Ordinance and 135 votes were cast at said regular City Election against said Ordinance, and that pursuant to the canvass of said votes heretofore made.

I hereby proclaim and declare said Ordinance to be in full force and effect as the Charter Amendments of the City Charter of said City of Marshfield, from the date of this proclamation.

School Notes

Marshfield's School census is 853. Attendance throughout the county has kept up better than the census. This indicates fewer young people in the county between the ages of 15 and 20.

Seven volumes of "The Speaker" have been added to the school library, a present to the school from the class of 1915.

A large part of the shipment of library books for the schools of Coos County was lost on the Santa Clara. Marshfield's share was included, of course, Next.

Pupils in Miss Sprague's room visited the polling place in the recent city election and went through the process of voting. The election board explained all details and the visit was very instructive.

A slide rule and a set of Ross mensuration blocks have been added to the equipment of the school for use in the teaching of mathematics.

Persons wishing to enroll in the night class in chemistry may do so. The class has begun its work, but entrance is still possible.

The Junior class of the high school will entertain at the Eagles Hall on the night of December 17. Invitations have already been issued.

The Coos County Round Table is a semi-social organization. Its membership consists of high school men of the county. At Coquille recently representatives were present from Bridge, Riverton, Myrtle Point, Bandon, Coquille, North Bend, Marshfield.

Vacation for the Christmas holidays will begin at the close of school Thursday, December 23d. School will begin again January 3. This will give an intermission of ten days.

There will be a spring vacation of one week the last week in March.

The new arrangement is made for the purpose of relieving the long strain of school work from December to June by one short period of complete rest. Teachers and pupils both have seemed to need this in previous years.

Report cards in both grades and high school were sent out last week.

The singing of German songs and the memorizing of German poetry is a feature of the work in second year German this year.

The art department has conducted a sale of Christmas supplies at the Owl Drug Store. Designs and coloring are the work of the pupils. Report has it that the eighth grade of the Central School has material for a good basket ball team.
