Renew Auto Licenses.—Judge Pennock is reminding autoists and chauffeurs that their licenses expire on December 31 and applications should be secured for new licenses. The applications are forwarded to the Secretary of State in Oregon. The licenses for 1916 will be red, as distinguished from the blue of 1915.

Is Seriously Ill.—Mrs. Annie Short has been quite seriously ill at the home of her daughter, Mrs. E. G. Flanagan. Yesterday her condition was regarded as quite alarming and her sons, Hillis and Watt Short, were called to the city. Later in the evening however Mrs. Short seemed to rally considerably but she is still seriously ill.

Fill Some of Holes.—Chunks of bitumen were placed in some of the largest holes on Front street, where the logging trucks have gone through the surface covering, the concrete base and down to the earth underneath. The plan, as outlined at the last Council meeting, is to fill these holes temporarily until the logging is finished and then have them all permanently repaired at once.

Announce Appointments Soon.—Mayor-elect R. A. Copple, who takes up the reins of city government at the first council meeting in January, said today that all of the appointments for 1916 have not yet been made, though he expects that the entire list will be completed within a few days, possibly next week some time. There have been many rumors of changes lately, though not one of them has as yet been confirmed.

False Alarm Sounded.—At 5:45 last evening there came a fire alarm call to First and Date streets, which sent the auto fire truck and the firemen scurrying to the house of Henry Havercamp, only to find that a false alarm had been turned in. There was not a trace of fire in the Havercamp home and the chimney was found as it should be. There was a heavy wind at the time, from the southwest, which would have made a fire particularly dangerous.

More Cable Is Taken.—A lot of Western Union telegraph cable, which has been lying at the Southern Pacific dock since the last trip of the Breakwater from Portland, was taken out yesterday across the bridge and the barge expressed in the railroad yards was that this is the cable that will be "sunk" across the Empress River. The cable is already laid across Coos Bay, this work having been done a week ago. The entire telegraph line is expected to be in operation by January 15.
