**CHORAL CLUB CONCERT**  
The great interest that has been manifested in the Marshfield Choral Club and the Male Chorus was more than amply justified by their concert last Sunday afternoon at the Noble Theater. The program was admirably chosen and ranged from the quiet beauty of Prothero's "Twilight" and the rhythmic brilliance of the "Miller's Wooing" by Fanning to the dignified grandeur of the Hallelujah Chorus.

The Choral Club under the baton of Gerald Hunt, was a surprise to the most enthusiastic supporters. The attacks were clean and vigorous, the tone quality of great volume and beauty, and the shading excellent. A special word of

praise is due the Male Chorus for the stirring vigor of their two numbers, which were enthusiastically received.

As a conductor, Gerald Hunt demonstrated another phase of his versatility. He conducts with authority and precision and has his forces well in hand at all times. Great credit is due him for the work done in this concert and there is no doubt but that under his leadership the chorus will become one of the best on the Coast.

Mr. Hunt also appeared as soloist and sang a group of songs with his usual refined artistry. The pathos of Dvorak's "Songs My Mother Taught Me" and the dramatic fervor of the Aria were most gratifying. Jenö Sevely was the other soloist and again proved himself an artist of distinction. His work was characterized by bigness of conception, exquisite delicacy, refinement and vigor.

Much credit is also due Miss Edna Larsen, accompanist, for the Choral Club and soloists, and G. W. Kaufman, accompanist for the Male Chorus, whose assistance contributed much to the most successful concert of its kind ever given in Marshfield.
