SUMMONS—SUIT IN EQUITY

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, in and for the County of Coos.

Marshfield Realty and Trading Company, a corporation, plaintiff, vs. Mary E. Buckler, defendant.

To Mary E. Buckler, defendant above-named: In the Name of the State of Oregon: You are hereby notified that you are required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled court and cause within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons: to-wit: Within six weeks from the 13th day of November, 1915, and if you fail to appear on or before the 29th day of December, 1915, such date being the last day of the time prescribed in the order for publication, judgment will be taken against you for want thereof for the relief demanded in plaintiff's complaint, a succinct statement of which is as follows:

That, plaintiff recover from you the sum of Six Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$650.00), with interest thereon at the rate of six per cent per annum from the 1st day of November, 1912 to date; that the plaintiff recover from you the further sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) as an attorney fee herein, and also its costs and disbursements in this suit.

That the mortgage heretofore executed by you on, to-wit: the 4th day of November, 1912, to this plaintiff, and conveying the following described real property, to-wit: Lot numbered Five (5) in Block numbered Twenty-two (22) in Dean & Co.'s First Addition to Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon, to secure the amount set forth above, be foreclosed as by law provided, that the usual decree of foreclosure issue and that said property be sold in the manner provided by law.

QUARTET BROUGHT INTO POLICE COURT FOR DRINKING

Two Girls and Male Companions, All Young, Plead Guilty—Are Severely Reprimanded

Two girls, one of them under 21 years of age, and two male companions, were found drinking on the dock at the foot of Central avenue this afternoon, and arrested by Chief of Police Carter. Charges of disorderly conduct were levied against Jennett McClellan, Jeanette Van Zile, Ralph Coliver and Walter Cronquist. All pleaded guilty and were fined \$5 a piece by Police Judge Butler, the fine being suspended during good behaviour.

Neither of the girls knew the names of the boys with whom they were drinking. There was another boy in the crowd, named "Skinney" who ran away when Chief Carter put in his appearance. He is known to the police.

The girls said they met the boys and were invited to have a drink of brandy. Cronquist produced a bottle and handed it first to Jennett McClellan and she in turn handed it to Jeanette Van Zile. "We only tasted it," the girls told the judge.

Miss McClellan lives in Curry County with her parents on a farm and said that she is here visiting with friends.

They were all given a severe lecture by Judge Butler and the girls advised to leave boys alone in the future who drink, and with whom they are not acquainted.

GASOLINE CRAFT BLAZES AND FIRE DEPARTMENT ANSWERS

Quick Work Saves Explosion and Possibly A Serious Blaze on Ocean Dock

Fire aboard a small 20 foot gasoline boat at the Ocean dock shortly before eight o'clock last evening called out the fire department and the flames were hurriedly extinguished before much damage had been done.

However, the blaze was a dangerous one while it lasted, because of the fact that if the flames had once reached the gasoline tank, the resulting explosion would possibly have set fire to the Ocean dock which at the time contained much merchandise just unloaded from the steam schooner Yellowstone from San Francisco.

The chemical sufficed in putting the boat out of danger. The craft had no cabin and about the only damage done was the burning up of some seats and a scorching of the engine, which is not believed to have been hurt to any extent.

PARDON FOR LEATON

FORMER EASTSIDE RECORDER IS FREE MAN

Has Been Out on Parol Since Last December and Resides Near Allegany

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 17.—Governor Withycomb has issued a pardon to William J. Leaton, convicted in Coos county of the larceny of public moneys while city recorder of Eastside. He was paroled in December, 1914, and the pardon restores him to full citizenship. The mayor of the town and Leaton both had access to the same safe, according to documents on file here, and five days after the money was stolen the mayor committed suicide. Leaton was convicted, and his friends have always contended that he was innocent of the offense.

HAVING HARD LUCK

ENGINEER COOK OF RUSTLER IS BACK TO HOSPITAL

Thought Injured Knee Was Well But Will Now Be Laid Up Several Weeks

R. S. Cook, the engineer on the gasoline schooner Rustler, is having a streak of hard luck in the way of being injured. Some weeks ago during a heavy rain storm he was struck while crossing the street by D. L. Foote's auto. At the time Cook thought that his knee had only been bruised but a few days later he suffered severely and it was found that the knee was broken. He went to the hospital and was there several weeks.

A few days ago he thought the knee was well and went back to work but before the Rustler sailed yesterday the trouble seemed to come back. An examination by a physician developed the fact that the break had not yet knitted together and the broken bones were rubbing together. This afternoon Cook went to Mercy hospital and it will be necessary to put the injured knee in a plaster cast for at least three weeks.

Mr. Cook some time ago had the little finger of one hand cut off. A small piece of the bone has loosened and it will be necessary to cut the finger down shorter. The amputation of the finger will be done now so he can be recovering from both ailments at the same time.

Engineer Hanson of the Roamer, which is tied up, will take Cook's place and will probably stay on the boat while Cook is laid up.

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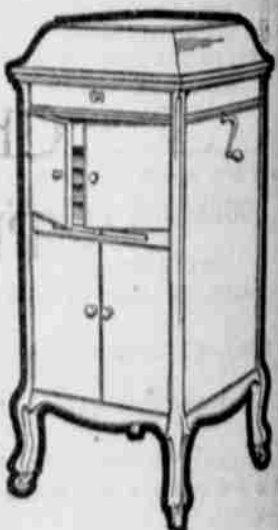
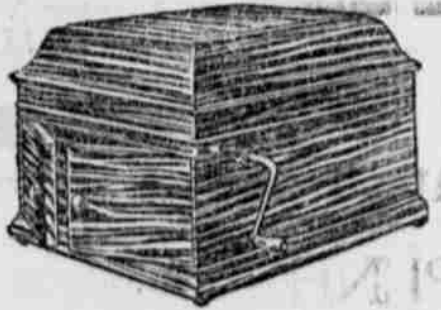
