CLASH WITH GREEKS

Bulgarian Troops Reported to Have Had an Encounter

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)
PARIS, Dec. 21.—A dispatch from Brindisi, Italy, to the Havas News agency alleges that fighting is reported between a small detachment of Greeks and Bulgarian troops. It alleges that several Greek officers and soldiers were killed and the Greek government hastily forwarding reinforcements.

"The Greek press maintains silence in regard to the incident," the dispatch adds, "but the government is disturbed."
