Postmaster Hugh McLain has announced that the rural free delivery route through Bunker Hill, Millington and up to the Harry Graves place and thence over the hill to Libby and back through Eastport, will be opened on next Monday morning, January 3. He warns all the patrons to get their mails boxes up on time and also to have their names painted on them so that the postman will have no difficulties in making his deliveries. There are more than 200 patrons on this line.
