To Stand Together.—A paper was being circulated today among the merchants who four years ago secured of the Merchants Mercantile Company, of Portland, a rating book, collections for which are now being forced. The paper is a guarantee that all of the merchants will stand together, assuming the costs pro rata, if suit is filed against any one of them by the Portland concern. The belief here is that they are being "buffaloed" and attorneys have advised them that they have made all payments promised in their contracts with the company.

Laid in Big Supply.—In anticipation of the long dry spell, as indicated by the prohibition barometer, Frank Talbot last night laid in a big supply of firewater. After filling every square inch of space he overdid the matter by trying to crowd in a little more. He "spilled the beans" and very shortly after that was so wobbly on his pins that an officer gave him a tow line for the Harbor of Refuge. Having taken a big cargo aboard, Talbot had no

space left for money, hence the general fund was the loser.

Sends Gold Sample.—John R. Smith today shipped 60 pounds of concentrates to California from his South Slough mining property. He says it will run \$12 to \$15 a pound and comes from a thick vein. He is sending it as a sample to parties in California who are looking into the property.

Is Still With Us.—Local physicians say there has been little change in the la grippe situation and that new cases are being reported, some of them in a serious form. The gripe is divided into four different classes, that is, it may affect a person any of these four ways, such as through the bones, the respiratory passages, etc., or it may affect them all four ways at once. The real seriousness of the gripe lines in what may develop later, such as pneumonia.

Prints Road Matters.—The Tri-County Bulletin No. 1 is the name of a four-page publication just received at the local Chamber of Commerce from Portland, where it is published. The sheet takes raps here and there at county officials around Portland who, in the belief of the publishers, have not gotten the most out of the money expended for roads. The assessed valuations per capita in coast counties is given as follows: Lincoln, \$1501; Columbia, \$1389; Curry, 1795; Coos, \$977; Clatsop, \$1192, and in Tillamook, \$2,667.
