CABIN WILL BE GONE

SOUVENIR HUNTERS DESPOIL HOME OF CANADIAN POET

While Robert Service is in the Trenches Fighting His Cabin is Being Carried Away in Bits

"POET OF SNOWS" ODE TO HIS CABIN

"Oh, dear little cabin, I've loved you so long,
And now I must bid you goodbye,
I've filled you with laughter,
Thrilled you with songs,
And sometimes I've wished I could cry.
Your walls, they have witnessed a weariful fight,
And rung to a won Waterloo,
But oh, in my triumph I'm weary tonight—
Goodbye, little cabin, to you!

I hear the world call and the clang of the fight;
I hear the hoarse cry of my kind;
Yet well do I know as I quit you tonight
It's Youth that I'm leaving behind.
And often I'll think of you,
Empty and black,
Moose antlers nailed over your door;
Oh, if I should perish my soul will come back
To dwell in you, cabin, once more."

SEATTLE, Jan. 1. — Word has reached here that while Robert W. Service has been playing handball with death, by throwing bombs in Flanders, tourists visiting Dawson have practically torn his cabin in pieces and cut up the logs for souvenirs. The moose head that hung over his head has shared a similar fate.

All of this is very exasperating to many northerners, who have a high regard for "Bob" Service, not because he has won fame in the literary world, but because of his many manly attributes. Northerners also have a sentimental regard for Service's cabin, and they are ever hoping for the day when he will come back to inhabit it.

Cabin Treasured by People.
The northern people love this cabin as they love "Bob" Service. Service is a quiet, diffident man yet one who always did his share and more, of the work on the trail. He never was too tired to do the thousand chores around a camp in winter. When he made the long march from Edmonton to the mouth of the Mackenzie River and thence across the dread Rat portage at Fort Yukon, a journey that occupied a year and a half in the wilderness, Service bore more than his share of the hardship and agony of the journey.

When fame and recognition had come to this northern bard and he was called to the outside, he didn't want to leave the north and the people he had come to know. In the cabin on the hill that he occupied they found pinned to the wall the verses of which two stanzas are quoted above.

Verses Appeal to Northerners
Some critics say the lines are not true poetry, but that makes no difference to the northerners. The verses have an appeal to them, for they express the feelings which northerners can understand.

Inside the cabin are a number of inscriptions and mottoes written by Service when he was struggling for the recognition which later came to him. The raspberry bushes and flowers which Service planted are still in the yard.

The cabin belongs to Mrs. Esther Clark, whose husband purchased it because of the magnificent north and the south view of the Yukon which it furnished. Mrs. Clark rented the cabin to Service, and when the northern poet left the Yukon, he turned it over to Major Noble. Mrs. Clark's will provides that the cabin must not be sold, but must be kept as Service left it, but if the vandalism of the tourists is kept up for another summer, there will be nothing left on the "sourdough habitation."
