Pioneer Very Ill.—Syver Backer, a well-known North Bend man and one of the big property owners there, is very ill of neuritis. Owing to his advanced age of 70 years, little hope is held out for his recovery. He has no relatives in this vicinity.

Its Raining Again.—Our friend, Pluv., shed a few tears through his heavens last night and during the day. The observation early this morning showed a total of 1.16 inches. So far this year Coos Bay had 36.72 inches of rain against 36.61 inches for this same time last year.

Instruments Going In.—J. J. Bayless, of the telegraph department of the Southern Pacific, who is here putting in the telegraph line for the Coos Bay, Roseburg & Eastern, is today installing the instruments. Very shortly now, it is expected this new line will be in operation through to the Valley points.

To be Temporary Officer.—Tomorrow morning Chief Carter leaves for Portland to be a witness for the government in the Shook case that comes up in Federal court for retrial on Monday. During his absence L. W. Traver will be temporary day officer and will look after the peace and quiet of the city.

Open Sundays.—Miss Gladys Diment, city librarian, announces that in order to accommodate the public, the Marshfield Public Library will be kept open Sunday afternoons from 2 to 5 o'clock, making the reading room available. Books may be returned during those hours, but no new books will be given out.
