Woods Resigns.—The following from a Roseburg paper will be of interest here. "W. D. Wood, postoffice inspector, who has been located here for the past 18 months, has resigned his position."

Leases Ranch.—Pat Childers has leased the E. W. Gupf ranch on South Coos River, one of the best ranches in that section. Warren Bessey, who has been occupying the ranch, is talking of going to the Columbia River. Mr. Bessey is a grandson of E. W. Gupf.

Haines Better.—W. U. Douglas and Dr. Houseworth are in receipt of letters from the Portland Sanitarium where W. R. Haines of Marshfield is being cared for saying that he is much improved. His physical condition is now good and he is rapidly recovering from the mental trouble.

Timber Cruisers Here.—H. D. McCool, a timber cruiser of Everett, Washington, came in yesterday on the stage and this afternoon went up Coos River. It is understood that several timber cruisers have come here of late and that in all probability a good sized timber sale will be reported within the next 30 days.

Petition Talked Of.—It was stated today in several places that a petition is being circulated among the property owners of West Bunker Hill to ascertain their opinion about coming into Marshfield. Mayor Copple said that he had heard nothing definitely about such a petition, thought he knew one had been talked of.

Plenty of Snow Found.—W. G. Chandler came down this morning from the W. S. Chandler home on South Coos River. He said there is about three inches of snow at their place and on Daniels Creek, back up in the hills, 15 inches are reported. It is said that the coming of rains now might result in good-sized freshets.

Hauling Is Delayed.—The hauling of logs from the McDonald and Condron camp was delayed this morning on account of the fact the big timbers were not coming out of the woods fast enough. Mr. Condron said that the snowfall west of the city was comparatively light and did not in any way hinder the operations of the loggers.

Timber Deal.—W. J. Conrad and others are reported to have about closed negotiations for about 20,000,000 feet of standing timber east of Sumner from Geo. Beale, formerly of Coos River but now in California. It is not considered a choice tract and is understood to have sold for about fifty cents per thousand stumpage.

Baptist Ladies Meet.—Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, the members of the Ladies' Aid and congregation of the First Baptist Church, will meet in the church parlors for their annual meeting. The pastor, Rev. H. B. Foskett, asks that all who can attend, do so, as there are important matters of business to be considered.

Council to Meet.—This evening the City Council will meet to consider several important matters of city business. It is probable that the proposition of improving North Front street will be up again for consideration. Both Mayor Copple and City Attorney Brand will be ready to report on a meeting in this connection with the members of the County Court at Coquille.

One Lone Democrat.—Some 20 Republicans and one lone Democrat have taken advantage of the new registration law so far this year, according to Registrar James T. Brand. And he said further that the one Democrat, at the time of registering, declared he was only a luke-warm party adherent. All voters are being urged to get their names on the list as rapidly as possible, as the new law affects every legal voter.

Mail Comes Through.—The mail that was delayed and did not reach Coquille in time for the early morning train on Saturday, came through all right in the evening and many of the patrons secured their mail that evening. There was no delay yesterday. The mail carriers had big packs this morning that made them look as though Santa Claus had come to town again. However, the mail failed to reach here this morning, but is expected tonight.

Uses Wireless.—When Agent L. C. Cushing, of the North Pacific Steamship company, was unable to get his wires through to San Francisco and Eureka to find out the location of the steamship Kilburn; he used the wireless. The vessel had not yet reported in Eureka from the south in the message received back from there late yesterday and for this reason the Kilburn is not expected here at least until tomorrow morning.

Sued for Loss of Eye.—Gay Lombard, a prominent Portland capitalist, who visited here but a short time ago, is being sued in Portland by an attorney named Farrell, who lost an eye in the elevator of the

Lumbermens Building, which is leased to Lombard. The sum of \$20,500 is asked. It is alleged that Farrell was descending in the elevator not long ago, when it suddenly stopped and the jerk sent a pencil that was in the pocket of another passenger, up into Farrell's eye.
