Funeral to be at Coquille.—The funeral of Henry Halverson, who died of typhoid fever at Mercy Hospital, will be held tomorrow in Coquille at 1:30 p. m. The body will be taken over there on the morning train. For several years Mr. Halverson resided in Coquille.

Gets A Better Job.—Many football enthusiasts on Coos Bay are today talking about the acceptance of Dr. E. J. Stewart, athletic coach at O. A. C., of the job as director of athletics at the University of Nebraska. His work starts next September. He leaves a \$2,600 job to accept one for \$4,000.

Moves to Marshfield.—C. G. Hall, Coos County representative of the White Sewing Machine Company, formerly located at Bandon and Coquille, has removed with his family to Marshfield and will hereafter make his home and headquarters in this city and has opened a branch agency on Market avenue.

TELLS OF GERMANY

SISTER OF GEORGE SEELIG WRITES ABOUT CONDITIONS

SAYS TURKS AND BULGARIANS BEING TRAINED AND WAR PRISONERS ARE MADE TO WORK

George Seelig has received a letter from his sister, Mrs. Kaupt, who lives at Wiesbaden, Germany, which contains some interesting information in regard to conditions in that country. A portion of the letter says:

"The people have every confidence in the government. Prices have risen but there are no unemployed and no speculation in food or other products.

"Bulgarian and Turkish recruits in vast numbers are being brought to Germany for training, several thousand of them being lodged in the military barracks at Wiesbaden.

"Thousands of French and Russian prisoners are used in the various industries, also as street sweepers in the cities and farm laborers in the country."

WATERFRONT DEAL IS STILL PENDING

As yet, the negotiations in a deal involving considerable Coos Bay waterfront has not been closed. The report that the property was desired for factory purposes is declared to be wrong, it being for warehouse purposes and also to be held for further development.
