KILLS TWO WOMEN
DISCHARGED SOLDIER COMMITS MURDER IN SAN FRANCISCO
Floyd Peyer Guilty of Awful Crime—Turns Gun on Himself and Suicides

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Jan. 12.—Floyd Peyer, a dishonorably discharged United States soldier, shot and killed Mrs. Marjorie Hill, injured her mother, Mrs. G. W. Evans so that she died later, wounded a sister, and killed himself today after he gained entrance to their apartments. Mrs. Effie Ramsey, another sister, dodged the bullets and saved herself and small daughter by hiding in a clothes closet.
