EUROPEAN WAR ONE
YEAR AGO TODAY

JANUARY 13, 1915
Count Leopold von Berchtold, Austro-Hungarian Minister of Foreign Affairs, whose note to Serbia brought on war, resigns.
The Germans claim to have driven the Allies from the trenches along the Belgian coast.
The Russians begin a new advance in East Prussia over the frozen Mazurian Lakes.
Tabriz, Persia, is occupied by the Turkish army after the evacuation of the city by the Russians.

WHAT THE WAR IS

ENGLAND is now turning to Lloyd George, the great Liberal labor leader to help her in the war muddle. He is the one prominent man in England who has seemed to grasp the significance of the great upheaval.
From the beginning Lloyd George alone comprehended what the war meant. Listen to this, from an early speech:
This is not a passing shower. It is the deluge. It is a convulsion of nature. It is a cyclone which is tearing up by its roots the ornamental plants of modern society and wrecking some of the flimsy trestle bridges of modern civilization.
It is an earthquake which is upheaving the very rocks of European life; it is one of those seismic disturbances in which nations leap forward or fall backward generations in a single bound. All this chattering about relaxing a rule or suspending a custom is out of place. You cannot haggle with an earthquake.

SUSPECT STAMPEDE

SOME THINK ROOSEVELT AFTER
REPUBLICAN NOMINATION
Rumor is that Delegates May Switch
Over at the Proper Moment
When Signal Is Given

(Special to The Times.)
WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 13.—Nine-tenths of the politicians hereabouts are convinced that Theodore Roosevelt is shaping his course with a view to carrying off the joint nomination of the Republican and Progressive parties for President. The action of the Colonel in withdrawing his name from the primary contest in Michigan has only inspired in the mind of the seasoned Congressional campaigner increased suspicion of Mr. Roosevelt's actual intent.
Both at Same Time.
The revelation that the Progressive party intends to hold its National convention in Chicago at the same time as the Republican gathering, which also will meet in Chicago on June 7, is regarded in political circles as particularly significant.
Colonel Roosevelt has been quoted as saying that he made two mistakes in the 1912 fight; he fought for delegates in the primary campaign and he went to Chicago for the convention. He is said to have determined to avoid those mistakes this time.

Plan a Stampede.
The plan of the Roosevelt men is to shape a situation intended to result in a stampede of the Republican convention. In this connection politicians are attaching much significance to reports from various parts of the country that Roosevelt managers are working for the selection of Republican delegates nominally instructed for favorite sons but secretly pledged to vote for the Colonel at a propitious moment.
Illinois Sherman delegates, it is rumored, will do this, although Senator Sherman says he does not believe the report.

From Other States
From West Virginia comes the report that the Roosevelt managers have been instructed to work for an uninstructed delegation friendly to the Colonel. In Missouri and Kansas the prospect, according to political gossip, is that the delegation will consist of Republicans who will not be adverse to voting for Roosevelt in the event that it appears possible for him to round up a majority of the convention.

FAIR WAS A SUCCESS

GREAT SAN FRANCISCO EXPOSITION BUILDINGS BEING RAZED

J. A. Ward, Manager Local Displays
At Exposition, Returns—Says
Dismantling Is Slow

Hundreds of thousands of people saw the Coos and Curry exhibits in the Oregon building at the San Francisco Exposition. J. A. Ward, manager of the displays, has returned from the south, on his first visit here since last May. He believes the exhibits have been of vast importance to the citizens of these two counties and well worth the expenditure of \$5,000.
On some days as many as 5,000 would pass the booths, says Mr. Ward. In this way were distributed thousands of Coos Bay booklets, the small folders sent there by the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce.
Native Woods Draw Crowds
The Sash and Door factory of North Bend elicited much attention with its displays of myrtle wood novelties and furniture. Many of these were sold.
In fact the native woods formed one of the best advertisements that could have been sent down, said Mr. Ward. The big myrtle wood Masonic arch, of the local lodge, was much admired. This has just been returned to Marshfield.
Dismantling Is Slow
The dismantling of the Exposition grounds and the buildings is slow. The exterior of the structures still remain intact in most instances. Spectators are still admitted to the grounds on a 25 cent charge and the big art building is to remain open until May 1.
Most of the exhibits, however, are being carried away, though some of the foreign displays are still untouched.

To Be a Normal School
The beautiful California building is to be retained as a state normal school. The legislature is to appropriate \$190,000 in putting it into shape for school purposes. The Hawaiian building has been donated to the city and the big aquarium has just been restocked. In this way many of the structures of the Exposition will remain permanently.

A good share of the permanent exhibits of the Coos and Curry displays have been forwarded to Portland to be put in the state display and there they will remain as a permanent advertisement for this section.
Mr. Ward moved most of his household effects to San Francisco, but says he is intending returning here to make his home. At the present time Mrs. Ward is with her mother who is very ill in San Francisco.

GOVERNOR PROCLAIMS
LETTER-WRITING WEEK
Sets Aside Time When All Should
Communicate With Friends
In Other States
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 13.—Governor Withycombe issued a proclamation declaring January 17 to 22, inclusive, Oregon Letter Writing Week.
"It appears that much beneficial publicity will result for Oregon and all its communities by the writing of letters descriptive of our state to our acquaintances, friends and relatives who have not the good fortune to dwell in Oregon," says the governor in his proclamation.
"During the week it is desired that the people and the organizations and communities of our state bend their energies to dispatching as many messages as possible to people in other states and countries of the opportunities, resources and attractions of Oregon and I further suggest that our newspapers, officials, school teachers and community organizations will do well to give the purpose and plans of Oregon letter writing week recognition and their hearty cooperation, so that organized effort for intelligent and far reaching publicity for Oregon may be achieved."

SOUTHERN PACIFIC
APPEALS LAND CASE
Declares that Railroad Company Is
Entitled to Resources of the
Lands Included in Grant
PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 13.—Appeal was taken in the federal district court by the Southern Pacific company from the recent decree rendered by Judge Chas. E. Wolverton on the decision of the supreme court in the Oregon-California land grant case.
The particular point of the decree objected to as stated in the appeal was that declaring that the railroad possessed no present interest in the grant beyond \$2.50 an acre as originally granted, and that the timber on the lands and the minerals therein are now subject to disposal with the lands. The railroad contends that the supreme court did not contemplate such a construction and claims ownership of the timber and other natural resources on the 2,300,000 acres of land.
In the appeal the supreme court is petitioned to change the form of decree so as to give the railroad everything but the actual land.

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CATTLE MAKE TRAIL

GREATLY ASSIST MEN REPAIRING WESTERN UNION LINE

One Hundred Head of Stock Beat
Down the Snow and Make a
Good Roadway

A band of cattle turned out to be of great help to the men who are making the repairs on the Western Union wire between Sitkum and Roseburg. The repair work was greatly hampered by the five feet of snow in the mountains, but the men had broken a small trail through after taking seven horses out of Sitkum to do it.
Before the storm a herd of 100 head of cattle was being driven out over the old Coos Bay wagon road. When the storm came they were stopped and put in pasture at a farm to await better weather for traveling. The cattle ate so much that feed ran out and it was necessary to move the cattle. There was no difficulty in making them follow the small trail that had been made through the snow, but by the time the hundred head of cattle had traveled over the snow, they had beaten down a good roadway, which will greatly assist the men working on the line in making progress.

DISTINGUISHED BOY
HAS RELATIVE HERE

Cousin of Secretary Lansing Who

The Portland Oregonian printed a large picture of Robert Lansing Sherman, a little boy of that city, who is cousin and namesake of Secretary of State Lansing. Mrs. Gagnon and the mother of the boy, Mrs. Francis A. Sherman are cousins. The Portland paper in commenting upon the incident in connection with printing the boy's picture says:
"Greetings to my namesake, Robert Lansing Sherman, from Robert Lansing," read the card which accompanied a loving cup sent by the Secretary of State to little Robert recently. Robert Lansing Sherman, who is the 5-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Francis A. Sherman, of Portland, and the cousin and the namesake of Secretary of State Lansing, received more real holiday happiness from the gift sent by his distinguished relative than all the others put together.

Little Robert Lansing Sherman was born in Portland and has never seen his notable cousin.

LANSING, Mich., Jan. 5.—The name of Henry Ford, who recently returned from his European peace mission, has a place on the Republican primary ballot in Michigan this spring. Enough petitions to make possible Mr. Ford's candidacy for President were filed with the Secretary of State this afternoon.

MANY CARS STOLEN

Auto Thieves Operate Extensively
in California of Late.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 13.—To combat the theft of automobiles in Los Angeles during 1914, Fred L. Baker, president of the Automobile Club of Southern California, has issued a list of "douts" for autoists. The club's theft bureau report for 1914 has been issued, which states that a total of 1034 cars had been stolen in 1914, valued at approximately \$1,000,000.

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BUY CIDER TESTER

'HUMAN BRAINED' CONTRIVANCE
SENSES ALCOHOL

Sheriff and District Attorney Arm
Themselves With Evidence Taker
—No More Hard Cider

No chance for vendors of cider to protest their innocence when they may be haled into court for selling cider containing more than one-half of one per cent of alcohol, for now the county is to have a patent "cider tester." The County Court has authorized the expenditure of \$63 for such a contrivance and District Attorney Liljeqvist has already sent his order East.
The appliance will be left at the Marshfield High School where Prof. Robertson, instructor in chemistry, may make the chemical tests when evidence is sent to him.
Cider was one of the first loopholes in the prohibition law to be blocked. Early in the game it was anticipated that perfectly sweet cider might be held for an indefinite time and then doled out to the boys with somewhat of a "kick" to it. Straightway the officers began their campaign, so now are arming themselves with the "happy little rig" that computes and settles all disputes.
So "Sherlock Holmes" and Dr. Watson will be entirely unnecessary in Coos with the coming of the "digger" that spots the presence in the cool, dank keg of more than one half of one per cent of alcohol.
