### TO TALK FRANCHISE

S. P. OFFICIALS AND COUNCIL TO MEET TONIGHT

Seek Settlement of Motor Car Question—To Institute Other Service—No Terminal Rate Yet

Southern Pacific officials tonight will meet with the city council, in open meeting to discuss with them the matter of changing the present franchise for hourly service between here and North Bend. It is known that at this time a change of service is to be advanced by the officials, the gist of which is as yet entirely unknown.

The report that the company would seek to take the motor car off the present run and put on a service to Lakeside and the Coquille Valley, is unconfirmed and nothing will be given out until the meeting of this evening.

Several times the franchise matter has been before the council. The last time most of the city fathers stated informally that they believed the franchise should be put aside for at least a period of three to five years allowing the use of the motor car for more extensive service.

The claim has gone out that the Southern Pacific is not content with such an arrangement, but would have the hourly service franchise done away with entirely.

Chief Engineer William Hood and Ralph Moody, attorney for the S. P. in Oregon, will represent their company.

#### Terminal Rates Maybe

Mr. Moody said today that D. W. Campbell, assistant manager of the S. P. lines, is now in San Francisco sitting on a board of hearing and will be there for two or three weeks to come. While he is there, in all probability, the matter of giving terminal rates to Coos Bay will be taken up.

Until that time, said Mr. Moody, nothing will be known regarding the terminal rates.
