The possibilities of the new Balcopicon are so great that some of us don't sleep for thinking about it. Think how grade geography could be vitalized, what practical hygiene could be taught, etc. etc.

Bausch and Lomb "Convertible Balcopicon" has been added to the equipment of the school. It is one of the best lanterns made and its possession widens immensely the field of instruction in every subject taught in the schools—grades as well as high school.

With this lantern the teacher is not dependent upon slides alone but can project upon the screen—postal cards, pictures in pamphlets, magazines, or books, and opaque objects with areas up to 8 inches square.

The machine is a base also for other attachments which were not purchased at this time. These include attachments for the projection of microscopic objects, transparent objects, liquids, X ray plates, the spectrum moving pictures, polariscope, etc.

Just to give an idea of the field opened by a lantern of this kind, it might be interesting to know that in October 1915, the extension bulletin of the University of Wisconsin gave a list of 242 lectures available for use—based on lantern slides alone. The University of Oregon conducts the same kind of work.

A grade athletic league has been organized by Mr. Grannis to stimulate exercise among the grade boys. It has great possibilities. We have talked some about asking the parents to meet us some evening to talk the matter over. But whether this is done or not, read the pamphlet that will be issued setting forth the directions and foster the effort. Much has been done along this line in the schools of Seattle and many of our ideas were taken from data that we had at hand—kindly sent us by the directors of the work in that city. It is a great work, and I am glad that we have the facilities to undertake it. At our suggestion Mr. Grannis has written for publication his own ideas on the same subject.

**Use of the Gymnasium by the Grades—By F. L. Grannis**

In making use of the gymnasium this year, it has been the endeavor to get every pupil from the fifth grade up and including the eighth to take some work and exercise.

This has been an easy matter for so many could not see the benefits that would come from some systematic work of that character—especially among the upper classes.

Class work, including calisthenics, bar work, club swinging and ring work, together with games of basketball, indoor base ball, and some of the less popular games have been the order of the work. This work becomes somewhat tiresome to the younger pupils so a new class of work is to be undertaken for the latter part of the year prepared primarily for boys though we hope to arrange something similar for the girls.

The boys have been divided into groups according to weight and tests of physical proficiency are to be made in each group. These tests become competitive as the two schools compete for best averages.

The tests consist of running, jumping, chinning the bar, vaulting the bar, and traveling on the rings.

A "Button" test as it called consists of running 60 yards in a specified time, jumping a required distance, and chinning the bar a specified number of times, and any boy may compete in this test at any time that he thinks he can fulfill the requirements. When the requirements are fulfilled, he receives a bronze button. A silver button is also offered, but the requirements are higher.

Swimming and diving are also to be given particular attention and requirements of endurance and skill have been set, which when attained secure for the contestant the right to have his name placed on the "Swimmers' Honor Roll" to receive a certificate of proficiency in swimming.

Later in the spring, a track meet is to be held made up of events which will not make too great a demand upon the endurance of younger boys. This is wholly competitive, class against class as well as school against school. Each member of a group enters two events and no boy can enter more than three. This gives the less proficient ones some chance in the competition and makes it a group contest instead of an individual one.

It is the sincere desire of the school, and the physical director that these contests shall give a broader view of what physical proficiency really means, and be a means whereby the idea of clean sports and
