One of the boys there will take the Western Union job. Peters has attended to his duties well and is a splendid messenger boy. He is changing because of better hours.

**Tear Out Sidewalks**—Dean and Brown, contractors, this morning began the tearing out of sidewalks on Commercial and Broadway streets, making ready for the fills that must be made about the Gow Why building before the concrete sidewalk is put down. Cal Langworthy has the contract for the moving of the electric light poles.

**Witnesses Are Served**—Subpoenas yesterday were served in North Bend by Deputy Sheriff W. C. Laird on Tom and Laythe Jennings and on Mrs. Jennings, the mother. They are to appear as witnesses in the case of the state versus Mert Jennings that comes up for trial on Monday morning. Mert Jennings is accused of robbery in North Bend about Christmas time.

**Handle School Books**—The Marshfield News Company has just put in a line of school books and supplies which will eliminate the troubles and drawbacks that the pupils of the Marshfield schools and nearby schools have hitherto suffered on this score. The line is complete and Messrs. Jarvis and Gabrielsen have arranged to look after all the needs of the pupils and teachers promptly and efficiently.

**Have Male Chorus**—The male chorus which was such a success last Wednesday evening at the Baptist church social will give two selections at the evening service next Sunday. It is expected that this will be made a permanent organization, and will have charge of the music on Sunday evenings. Rehearsal will be held this evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. R. P. **Jetty Not in Congress**—Henry Sengstacken, secretary of the Port Commission, this morning received a letter from Chairman Sparkman, of

the Rivers and Harbors committee, thanking him for pictures of the Coos Bay jetty, showing its condition. One was the picture of the steam schooner Claremont wrecked on the end of the jetty. Mr. Sparkman said that the bill for a jetty has not yet been introduced but that when it is he assures it will be given hearty consideration.

**Error in Price**—Through a typographical error, the price which the Elks are supposed to be willing to pay for the Helmer property, was given last night at \$1000, instead of \$2500. The item should have read "\$100 per front foot or \$2500 for 25 feet frontage." The lot is immediately adjacent to the Elks property at the northeast corner of Third and Commercial, Helmer's representatives asking \$3400 for it. The lot is now occupied by a portion of the old livery barn of Levi Helmer.

**Can Get No Boat**—Tom James finds that for the present he is unable to get a boat to carry freight between Portland and Coos Bay points. He first attempted to charter the Tillamook and found that she only can be purchased. He has just tried to get the gasoline schooner Anvi, but her owners state it would take a month to put her in commission and that they do not want to charter the vessel. Tom James is still hoping to get hold of a vessel to make this run and perhaps take in San Francisco.
