MAKING CHEESE SCOTCH TO MEET

LOCAL CREAMERIES FIND MORE MONEY IN THIS PRODUCT.

Quit Manufacture of Butter for the Present—Is Hinted Wholesalers are Speculating.

Two of the large creameries of Coos County have discontinued the making of butter and have gone in to the exclusive manufacture of cheese.

The wholesale cheese market is in an unsettled condition. Local wholesalers and also those in outside points, state that they do not know exactly "where they are at."

There is a hint that some of the larger wholesalers are speculating and right now are sending the price of cheese skyward in hopes of getting most of the creameries to making cheese and then the price will be dropped and the market bought up in preparation for the next rise.

At this season of the year it is difficult to get milk. Many of the herds have gone dry and will remain so until spring comes.

Wholesale Price is High.

Cheese now is wholesaling at about 18 cents a pound and butter at 29 and 30 cents. With milk testing in the neighborhood of five per cent of butter fat cheese runs about 12 pounds of milk thus netting the producer about \$2.16.

Expect Price to Drop. With the coming of spring it is expected the price of cheese will drop.

again. Last year it was once as low as 12 cents a pound, wholesale. Many more producers will be on the market with their cheese manufacturers and it is probable that some of them will be forced back into the butter game again.

But right now only the California brands of butter are on the local market, at about five cents a pound in advance of the retail price for Coos county butter.

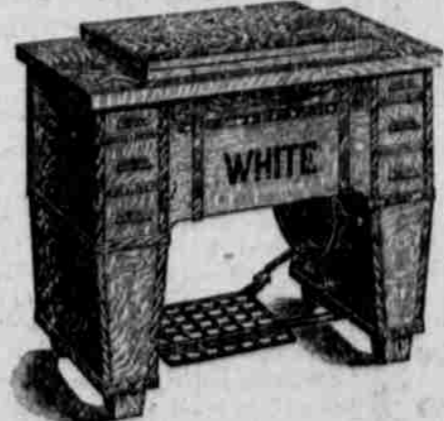
