WANT HATCHERY

FISHERMEN SAY THAT ONE IS NECESSARY ON TEN MILE
Seek Aid Through a Petition
St. Dennis Says 100,000 Trout Needed This Year
Trout in Ten Mile Lakes are getting mighty scarce, says Charles St. Dennis, postmaster of Lakeside, who today was in the city. Something must be done immediately to restock the lakes or the railroad is going to bring outside fishermen here to be doomed to disappointment. He believes, and there are a dozen of local fishing enthusiasts of the same opinion, that a hatchery must be established on Tenmile.
"We ought to have 100,000 trout this year," said Mr. St. Dennis this morning. "Two years from now they would make prime catches. The trout in the lakes now are easily thinned out."
Ask State Aid
Last night at the Chamber of Commerce banquet in North Bend the move was placed on foot to seek state aid for the establishment of a hatchery, and this falling, as a last resort, the matter will be taken up possibly through private subscriptions.
Several days ago Mr. St. Dennis enlisted the aid of J. W. Bennett in the matter. On the spot a petition was written out and circulated here and in Lakeside. It was liberally signed and forwarded to the State Fish and Game Commission as immediate action is necessary if anything is to be done this year.

Proposition Made
T. J. Scammons has a private hatchery on Eel Lake. He has offered to move his paraphernalia to Tenmile and raise 100,000 trout for \$50 a month, or \$600 a year. It is possible his proposition will be taken up.
