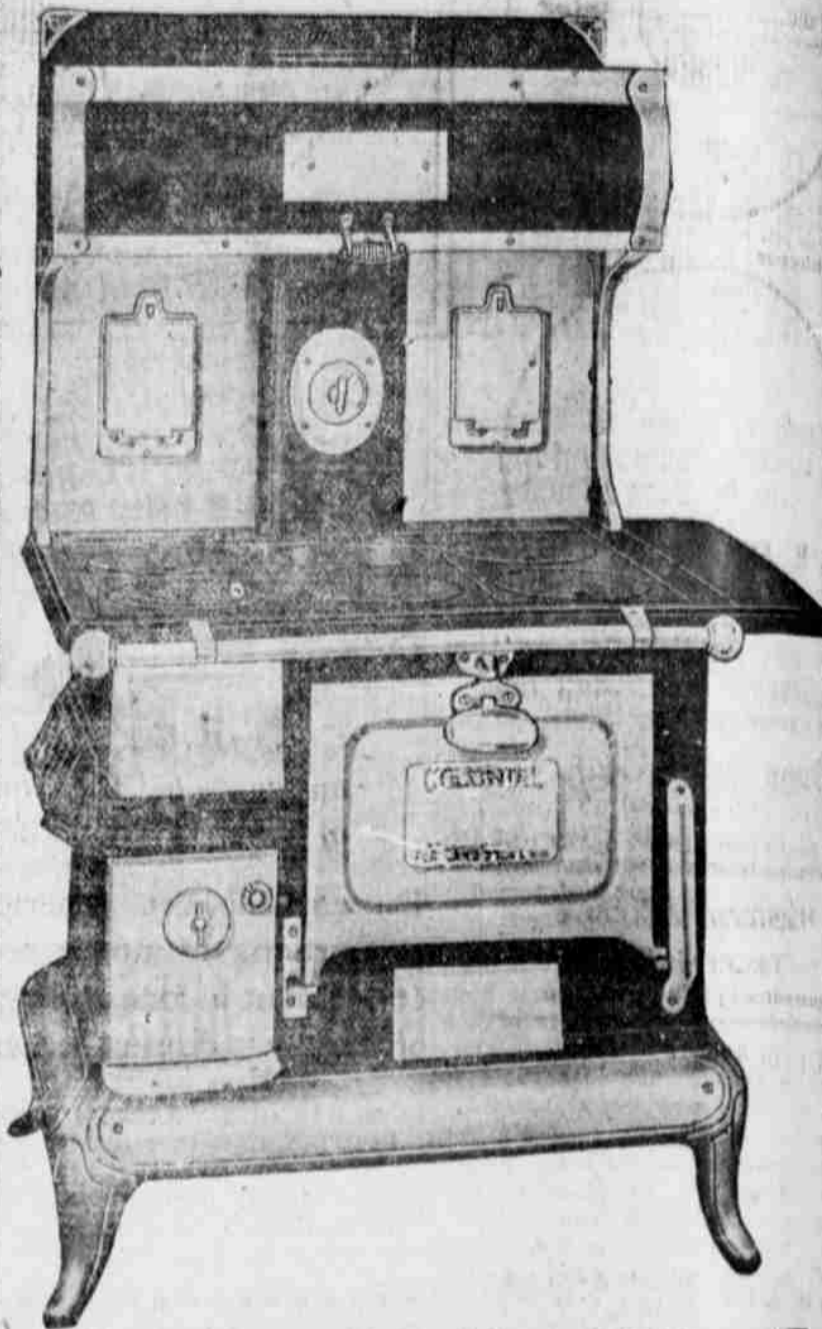
JOLLY DOZEN CLUB
