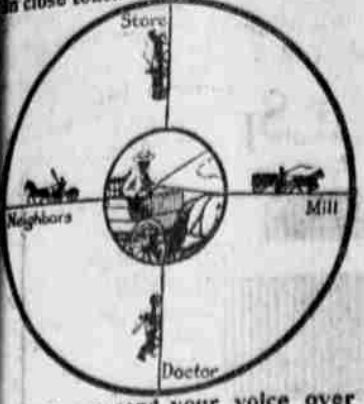
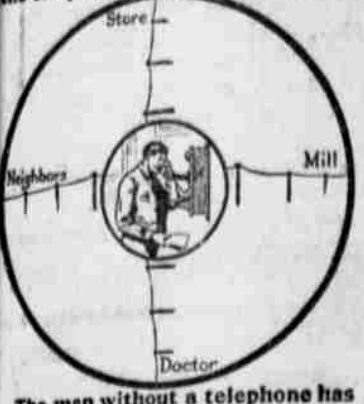

A. N. W. CLUB

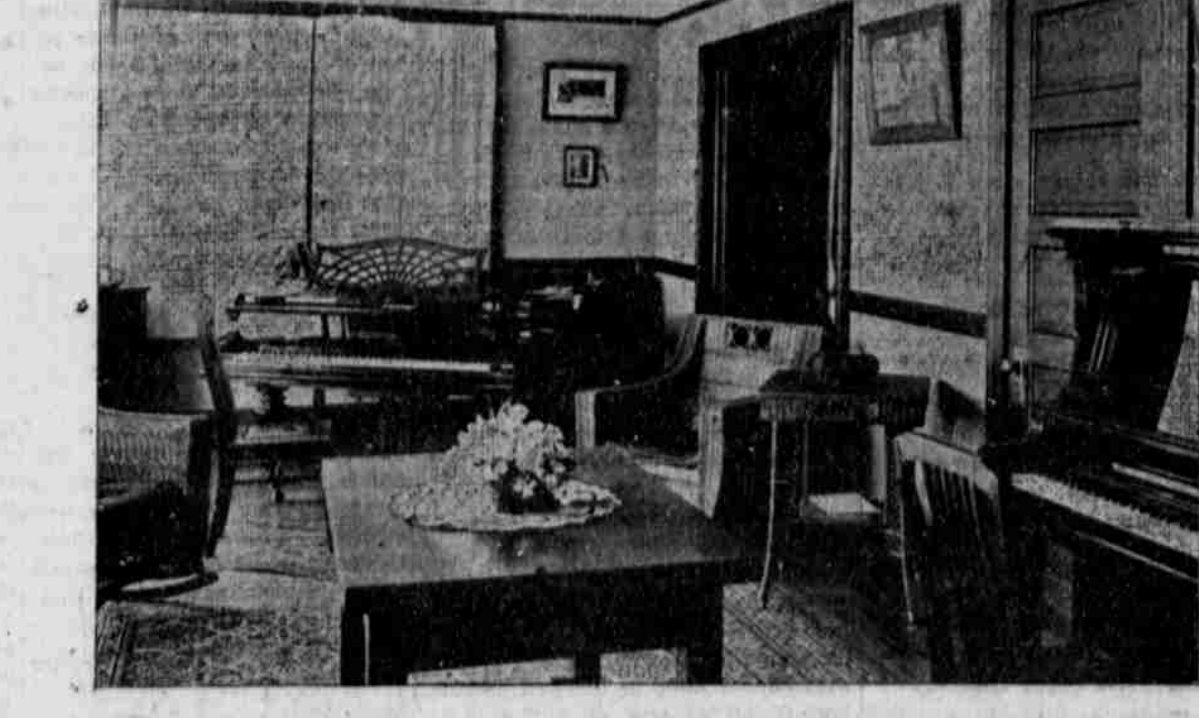
