

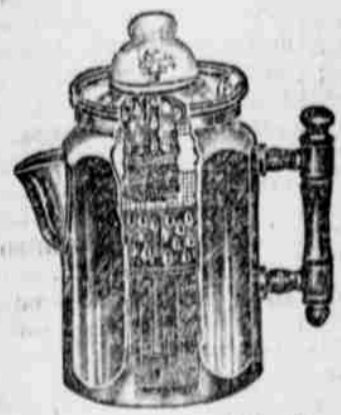

### TWENTY FEET OF SNOW

Never in the history of Coos Bay has the present snow fall been equalled. Judge Coke stated this morning that never during his forty-one years residence on the Bay has there ever been a snow fall like the present. Trains in and out of Marshfield were stalled last night. Even the big motor could not make headway against the heavily packed snow. Jitney service about town for a time was practically out of commission. W. A. Reid is quoted as saying that there is twenty feet of snow in Perham Park and that in places the tree tops were covered. He did not qualify his statement as to the area covered by twenty feet of snow or explain that all the tree tops were similarly covered. In his eagerness to assist in building up this popular residence district he was busy erecting snow houses patterned after the style of Eskimau homes along the Arctic coast, in which he is quite expert after his fourteen years residence in Alaska. If the present weather continues this form of residence may become quite popular as there is an abundance of building material to be had without cost.

## YET UNDECIDED

### NORTH BEND AND MYRTLE POINT MUST DEBATE

### Winners Will Be Coos County Champions and Will Contest for State Honors

The debating teams of North Bend and Myrtle Point must meet to decide the Coos County championship although the North Bend team is one point ahead.

The results of the debates last evening were as follows:

North Bend won from Coquille at North Bend, 4 to 0.

North Bend won from Bandon at Bandon, 4 to 0.

Marshfield won from Bandon in Marshfield, 4 to 0.

Myrtle Point won from Marshfield at Myrtle Point, 4 to 0.

Myrtle Point won from Coquille at Coquille, 3 to 1.

### To Decide Champion

In deciding the debate one point was allowed for the decision and one point for the opinion of each judge. North Bend got all four points in each debate. Myrtle Point got four points in one debate and only 3 in the other. This gives North Bend 8 points and Myrtle Point 7 points but according to the rules adopted by the Coos County Debating Association when both teams of one school win both debates, regardless of points, it is a tie and they must meet each other. North Bend and Myrtle Point must meet to decide the championship. Likely it will be planned for the affirmative team in each case to go to the other city and the negative teams stay at home thus giving the people an opportunity to hear both teams of their home school.

### To Meet Astoria

The details of the last meeting to decide the championship are being worked out by the schools affected. It is likely that the team winning the county championship will meet Astoria first in contesting for the state honors.

The following are the points received by each team as a result of the debates last evening: North Bend, 8; Myrtle Point, 7; Marshfield, 4; Coquille 1; Bandon, 0.

Marshfield won unanimously in the debate here with Bandon, but lost 4 to 0 at Myrtle Point.

The North Bend affirmative team, composed of Alex Brandt and Horace Byler, met the Coquille negative, including Miss Mary Levar and Miss Myrtle Cunningham. Both teams put up exceedingly good arguments.

### Marshfield vs Bandon

In Marshfield Miss Eva Hansen and Miss Ruth Cowan of Marshfield represented the affirmative, against Miss Chapburn and Miss Thornton, of Bandon, on the negative.

The judges in Marshfield were Cleud H. Giles, of Myrtle Point; Edgar McDaniel, of North Bend; and Raymond E. Baker, of Coquille. Tom T. Bennett presided and at the conclusion of the debate J. T. Brand gave a brief talk on the value of debating.

### North Bend vs Coquille

At North Bend Alex Brandt, of North Bend, opened the affirmative debate. Also he came back with a very strong rebuttal. He was ably assisted by Horace Byler. Both of the young women from Coquille were applauded for their clever arguments. The judges were F. E. Allen, Dr. R. W. Morrow and M. C. Maloney, editor of the Coos Bay Times, all of Marshfield.
