# HEIR SEEKS MONEY

MISS EUNICE KINNICUTT WOULD CLEAR UP OLD ESTATE

Asks Final Accounting from W. E. Pike, Guardian—Five Helps Left About \$50,000 Years Ago

Asking that W. E. Pike, guardian, appear and show cause why he should not be removed, a petition to this effect and also asking him for a final accounting was filed today in the county court by attorneys for Miss Eunice Craig Kinnicutt, of Myrtle Point.

The estate which she seeks to have cleared up was left by Harriet and Amy Kinnicutt, of Worcester, Massachusetts, to five Kinnicutt heirs some 15 years ago. It amounted to \$50,000. For years it has been in the courts.

**Claim Having Settled**  
The claim is made that Mr. Pike, as guardian, has already settled with William W., Olive B. and Thomas B. Kinnicutt, brothers and sister of Eunice Kinnicutt. Also the attorneys say he has partially settled with Amy H. and Eunice Kinnicutt.

They state the position taken by Mr. Pike is part of the funds were lost in the collapse of the Roseburg bank of which T. R. Sheridan was president.
