News of Nearby Towns

WATER RISES RAPIDLY AT ROGUE RIVER

Dangerous Freshet Was Feared for a Time, but Creaked by a Cold Snap

Curry County has been suffering from storms much the same as this locality. According to correspondence from Rogue River there was danger of a freshet there last Sunday. The water was very high and arrived considerable drift and a report from Lowry's shows that the water has risen 20 feet during the last 12 hours but later reports show that it was rising more slowly. A crew of men were working under the direction of Tom Carey, secured the boats and made the store and other buildings belonging to the Wedderburn Trading Co. secure with cables. The cold snap which came topped further freshets.

TAX IS LIGHT

One Half Mill All That's Necessary to Support Coquille Port

A port tax of one-half of one mill will be all that will be necessary to maintain the Port of Coquille River for the next year according to the report of M. E. Stemmler, president of the port. The report submitted is as follows: "With the close of 1915, the work of clearing the banks of the upper river and removing snags has been completed to the Fox Bridge on the North Fork and to Letherman's place on the East Fork and to the upper end of McNair's place on the South Fork. "Boats of light draft can now navigate these waters to advantage during the rainy season, or while the roads are practically impassible. With very little maintenance work farmers will be able to use these rivers for seven or eight months of the year, making regular trips to the creamery and to town with comfort, as some are now doing. "The loggers have had less difficulty in moving out logs this winter than ever before. "With the removal of the Rackleff bar and the bar at the mouth of the South Fork, with protective bulkheads in place as outlined by our engineer and ourselves, with this work done in 1916 there should be no call for heavy expenses to the Port. A yearly tax of one-half mill will raise adequate funds to maintain the upper river in a good condition for craft during the rainy season."

EDITOR MAY SUE

Drain Man Wants \$50,000 Damages for Slander

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., Feb. 2.—L. C. Beebe, former editor of the North Douglas Herald, at Drain, the plant of which was destroyed by fire some time ago, and who has received the nomination for postmaster of new town, was in the city yesterday securing legal assistance for a \$50,000 damage suit he is going to bring against residents of Drain for circulating a petition containing his name and which he claims was circulated for a malicious purpose and is extremely defamatory. The petition is in the form of a remonstrance gotten out by citizens of Drain when it was learned that the editor had received the nomination for the postmastership. Reports reaching here from Drain are that most of the leading citizens there vigorously protested the nomination of Beebe as postmaster, and that his appointment has been held up. They declare no improper methods were used and ridicule the idea that there is any foundation for a damage suit against them.

DRINKS JAMAICA GINGER

ROSEBURG, Feb. 2.—Unable to obtain sufficient liquor as the result of the new prohibition law, W. Fitzgerald, foreman of the railroad construction gang employed on the Oswego, Dallas & Roseburg Railroad, drank a quantity of Jamaica ginger. He became half crazed, according to reports reaching Roseburg, and threatened his companions. Sheriff Quine arrested Fitzgerald, who was brought to Roseburg and placed in jail.

INJUNCTION DIES

Judge Refuses to Continue Ruling Regarding the Blue Law

HILLSBORO, Ore., Feb. 2.—Circuit Judge Bagley dissolved the temporary injunction restraining enforcement of the Sunday closing law. Upon the announcement of the opinion of the United States District Court, which automatically dissolved the restraining order, counsel for the affected dealers sought and procured a continuance pending appeal of the Brunswick-Balke-Collender Company case to the United States Supreme Court. Further continuance is denied in the opinion given.

WOULD ADVERTISE

Lumberman Says That is What Should be Done.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Feb. 2.—The necessity of advertising the lumber trade was presented to the Southwestern Lumbermen's Association convention by President J. E. Marra, who said the lumber industry is now emerging from its lean years with a definite program of enlargement. He said: "If substitutes for lumber have displaced wood, it is only because the manufacturers of the substitutes have assisted the retailers through publicity to sell their product. We now have an extension service in the National lumber industry which for the next five years will promote all forest products."

Douglas Grange Also Condemns Action of the Governor

ROSEBURG, Ore., Feb. 2.—Asserting that Governor Withycombe had used the offices of the State Fair Board for political purposes, the members of Pomona Grange of Douglas County adopted a resolution lauding J. H. Booth, former president of the State Fair Board, for his work while employed in the capacity and condemning the Governor for bringing about his removal. Another resolution was adopted protesting against the continuance of improvement work on the Pacific Highway until such time as the laterals are improved.

HAVE GOOD YEAR

Farmers' Union Store Does \$63,000 Cash Business in Year

The Farmers' Union Store of Coquille reports a cash business of \$63,000 during the past year, according to the Sentinel. A stockholders' meeting of the company has been called to meet at the W. O. W. hall on Saturday, February 19, to vote on the proposition to increase the capital stock of the store from \$5,000, divided into two hundred shares of the par value of \$25 each, to \$25,000, divided into one thousand shares of the par value of \$25 each.

REPORT REGISTRATION

Weekly Returns Are Made to the Secretary of State

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 2.—Registration in the state since January 1, according to returns filed with the Secretary of State, total 17,245, of which number 11,927, or 69 per cent, are Republicans, Democrats registered number 4007, or 23 per cent of the total. Slightly more than 2 per cent, or 349, Socialists are listed, while, with 282, the Prohibition party's registration is just under 2 per cent of the total registration. With only 105 Progressives, that party's percentage of the total registration so far is but six-tenths of one per cent. Miscellaneous registrations number 575, or 3.4 per cent of the total. The returns to date indicate that no registrations have been recorded in Baker or Curry Counties. The law requires reports to the Secretary of State weekly, and only these two counties have not reported.

HAS DRUNKARD LIST

Some Are Checked From Securing Liquor From Outside

GATEWAY, Ore., Feb. 2.—Continuation has been caused among several citizens of this place by the appearance of their names on "Habitual Drunkard" lists that have been given the railway agents in Jefferson County by the Prosecuting Attorney. Great dissatisfaction, too, has been expressed by many of the persons affected, who contend that it is a question as to what constitutes an habitual drunkard.
