President Wilson on the Churches

HE business of the church is not to pity men. The business of the church is not to restue them from their suffering by the mere means of material relief, or even by the means of spiritual reassurance. The church cannot afford to pity men, because it knows that men, if they would take it, have the richest and completest inheritance that is possible to conceive, and that rather than being deserving of pity, they are to be challenged to assert in themselves those things which will make them independent of pity. No man who has recovered the integrity of his soul is any longer the object of pity, and it is to enable him to recover that lost integrity that the Christian church is organized. To my thinking, the Christian church stands at the center not only of philanthropy, but at the center of education, at the center of science, at the center of philosophy, at the center of polities; In short, at the center of sentiem and thinking life. And the business of the Christian church of the Christian minister, is to show the spiritual relations of men to the greater world processes, whether they be physical or spiritual. It is nothing less than to show the plan of life and men's relations to the plan of life.
