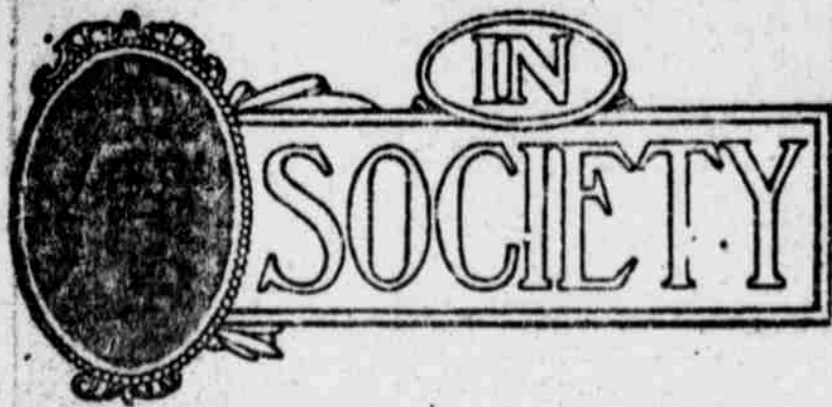

COUNTY NOW PARENT TO SEVEN KIDDIES BETWEEN 2 AND 16

Taken From South Inlet Parents After Siege of Almost Starvation—Go To Coquille

Coos county has adopted an entire family. This is the result of Judge James Watson's investigation yesterday of the Charles Coffin family from South Inlet. The hearing was held at Empire.

Seven children between the ages of 2 and 16 years appeared in the juvenile court at Empire.

They were poorly clad, unkempt and the story told was a pitiful one of a rather weak fight against starvation. Only the timely assistance of neighbors perhaps saved them.

The father and mother are both living. The former is between 50 and 60 years of age and said that he could not get work. The children will be taken to Coquille and taken care of by the Boys and Girls Aid society of the county. They will go over with Hark Dunham, juvenile officer.

LOUIS KNAPP CLAIMS WAS DRIVEN FROM OWN FARM

Brings Suit Today Before Judge Coke Against Silas Bond—Both Own Interests in Big Ranch

Claiming that despite the fact he owns seven eighths of an 827 acre ranch near Port Orford, the owner of the one eighth of the property refuses to let his stock graze on the land and "shooes" off his employees, Louis Knapp, veteran hotelman and land owner at Port Orford today brought suit against Silas Bond in the equity court. The case was being heard this afternoon before Judge Coke.

Takes Full Possession

In the affidavit submitted by Mr. Knapp he sets forth that the defendant asked permission of him to go on the land to improve the property. This, says Mr. Knapp, was granted, but no sooner did Bond get there than he took complete charge of everything.

John D. Goss of this city appeared as attorney for the plaintiff and C. H. Buffington, of Gold Beach, for the defendant.
