Taken Into Army--Purdy Scott, formerly of North Inlet, went to Prince Edward Island to visit his mother. He had been there a few days when he was ordered to the army and must go to the front.

Sidewalk Grows--Considerable progress was made today by Dean and Brown, contractors, on the sidewalk being put in along the business district. The concrete mixer attracted a good sized audience through the day.
