Toll Line In.—On Saturday the Coos and Curry Telephone Company completed a toll line into Beaver Hill, over the poles in use by the railroad. Permission to use them

was received last Monday and Saturday the work was completed.

Much Mail Goes.—On the morning train to Coquille went two dry loads of parcels post for the Valley. The shipment yesterday aboard the Kilburn was a good sized one, there being many sacks for Marshfield and North Bend also.

Get Helmets.—The Marshfield Fire Department today received two smoke helmets which were ordered last July. The demand for the helmets by the warring nations as protection in gas attacks caused the delay in filling the local order.

At Roseburg.—Judge John F. Hall, Grand Master of the Oregon I. O. O. F., Saturday evening paid his official visit to the Odd Fellows and Rebekah Lodges of Roseburg. He is making a tour of the Central and Southern Oregon Lodges.

Elk Official Coming.—W. R. Rogers, District Deputy of the B. P. O. E. for Oregon, will make his annual visit and inspection of the Roseburg Elks Lodge February 24 and it is expected that he will be in Marshfield within a few weeks.

Tax Matter Deferred.—According to F. B. Waite the Kinney tax matter will probably not be taken before the county court before March 1 when the commissioners hold their next meeting. E. R. Bryson, attorney of Eugene, is expected here today or tomorrow in connection with the matter.

No Council Tonight.—There is to be no meeting this evening of the City Council, the fathers of the municipality having adjourned last Monday evening for two weeks. With the logging question settled the Councilmen say they are now looking for new worlds to conquer, hardly feeling comfortable unless they have something to worry them.

Excursion Later Maybe.—It was because of the piledrivers that are now on the track between here and the Umpqua that the excursion of the motor car could not be made yesterday to Reedsport. V. G. Hindmarsh, engineer in charge, said the trip would be impossible. There is a chance that shortly the trip may be essayed as an excursion with the motor car.

Wilson Petition. — A Woodrow Wilson petition, to place the president's name on the ballot at the next election for president, has been received by Hugh McLain, chairman of the Coos county democratic committee. The petition is sent out by G. Y. Harry, of Portland, general organizer of the Woodrow Wilson league of Portland. The petition will be called in April 1.

Young Jap Dies. — Tobaru Shito aged 19, died early yesterday morning at Mercy hospital. He was taken ill at Beaver Hill and brought to Mercy hospital Saturday night, suffering from an internal hemorrhage which proved fatal within about six hours of his arrival here. He was a son of Q. Shito, who for several years was the house servant of C. J. Millis, in Marshfield.

May Go Higher.—There is a possibility that the local gasoline prices will go still higher. It is now retailing at 22 cents a gallon and the eastern market is quoted at 25 to 27 cents. C. W. Cumbers, local agent of the Standard Oil company, said there is an unusual demand now for oil and that much oil is being shipped from this country. He thinks that the raise will not be for a great length of time.

To Reedsport on Train.—J. E. Montgomery is one of the first Coos Bay citizens to indulge in a ride over the Willamette Pacific to Reedsport. He went up there on Friday, via the construction train. The long trestle piling on Lake Takenitch has been completed, a difficult and important piece of construction and there remain only about five miles for rails to be laid to reach the Umpqua.

John M. Scott Coming.—John M. Scott, general passenger agent for Oregon of the Southern Pacific, is expected here this week. In a letter to James Montgomery, of the publicity committee of the Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Scott states that the Southern Pacific in 30 days will have off the press a 16-page booklet on the Willamette Pacific and the Coos Bay country that will do much toward advertising this section.

California Weather.—Two bad storms hit San Diego. Newspapers

from the South carried the accounts but of late the understanding has been that everything had been adjusted. This morning Miss C. Esther Whitney received a letter from friends there stating that train service into San Diego will be impossible for at least two weeks. After the first storm crews began repairing the bridges and the second storm wiped out their work. A derrick weighing several tons, so the letter stated, had been washed away and has not yet been found.

Go For Engineer.—C. R. Peck, attorney for the Port of Umpqua, with Warren Reed, one of the Port commissioners, expects to leave tomorrow for Portland for a consultation with the U. S. Board of Engineers. The Port has an ordinance ready for passing that will raise a \$200,000 tax in that district for the building of a jetty at the mouth of the Umpqua river and they want the government to match dollar for dollar in the project. It is also understood that the commissioners will try to secure an engineer to take charge of the work for the Port of Umpqua.
