A news paper must know the identity of those who wish to put their opinions in print or contribute a news iten from territory not touched by au thorized reportorial representatives Ordinarily one who is unwilling to disclose his identity when he con tributes to a newspaper is not the sort of correspondent who is to be depended upon

Best Cow and Herds

Results of the first year's work show that Cape Brothers have the best herd in the association, the average per cow being 352 pounds of butter fat. A. J. Marsh, of Elk river, has the best cow, the animal having produced 381 pounds of butter fat The records showed exactly what has been done by every cow during the year. One herd was found that went as low as 132 pounds of butter fat per cow. There were in 1915 a total of 540
