**Aunt Is Buried.**—R. E. Hampton has returned from Norway where he went to attend the funeral of his aunt, Mrs. Harrison Hartley, aged 89 years. She died at Myrtle Point on Saturday. She had long been a resident of this section.

**Committee to Meet.**—The membership committee of the Millicoma club will meet in the club rooms this evening to talk over the campaign that is now on for new members. A meeting was called yesterday, but the good weather defeated the purpose and few reported.

**Get New Cars.**—J. R. Tower last night delivered a Model 52 Overland to Walter Hill of Hill avenue. Today Mr. Tower went to Myrtle Point where he will deliver a Model 52 Overland to Henry Schroeder. Mr. Tower also expects a model 75 Overland to arrive next week for delivery to a Marshfield man.

**Get Out Logs.**—C. E. Carey, who is logging Tom Lawhorne's tract of timber above Allegany, got out about 250,000 feet of logs on the recent freshet. There is between 2,500,000 and 3,000,000 feet in the tract he is now working on and he may secure other timber. The Swayne & Hoyt mill is buying his logs.

**Day Is Observed.**—Washington's birthday was partially observed in Marshfield. The banks were closed and this afternoon the school children in both schools held appropriate exercises with the old soldiers as the guests of honor. There were no mail deliveries or collections and the windows at the postoffice were open for an hour before noon. There were many displays of flags from the buildings.

**Sell 's Products.**—J. O. Holt, manager of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association, who spoke here on the cannery subject last Saturday, sees in the opening of the Willamette Pacific railroad a good opportunity to sell on Coos Bay and all through this section hundreds of dollars' worth of canned goods from the Eugene cannery. Mr. Holt is a keen salesman and this is one of the main reasons that the concern at Eugene has been so successful.

**Tank Is C.**—It is expected that on Saturday the redwood lumber for the big Coos Bay Water company tank in North Bend will be shipped from San Francisco. The lumber has been cut there in the proper lengths. The Redwood Manufacturing company, the concern that has the contract for the building of the reservoir, will send an expert. It is expected that the foundation for the tank will be complete this week if the weather remains favorable.

**Bigbee to Beavers.**—Big Lyle Bigbee, brother of Carson and Morris Bigbee who formerly were members of the Marshfield baseball team, has been drafted by Judge McCredie for the Portland Beavers this season. The team will open practices very shortly. Bigbee is a "southpaw." He is a husky fellow and good at football, basketball and swimming, as well as baseball. He has been with the teams of the University of Oregon for the past three or four years.

**May Extradite.**—Sheriff Johnson while he was here yesterday stated he did not know whether or not I. Rosenbergs, the Coquille tailor, would fight extradition from Crescent City, California. If he does, Deputy Sheriff W. C. Laird will have to go out to Salem and secure the necessary papers and then take a trip to Sacramento to see the California Governor before he can bring Rosenbergs back to answer the charge of cashing a bogus draft on the Bank of Bandon.

**Bound to Have Jetty.**—The port of Umpqua is bound to have a jetty. Without waiting for the Government's promise to match dollar for dollar in the project for the mouth of the Umpqua it is understood here that they intend to go ahead and do at least \$200,000 worth of work on a north jetty. C. R. Peck and Warren Reed compose the delegation bound for Portland today to confer with the government engineers. They want an engineer recommended by the government to have charge of the work for the port.

**Boston Unsavorthy.**—Immediately on receipt here of the news that the old gunboat Boston was to be

outlived her usefulness, the question was debated here whether or not to apply to the navy department asking that the vessel be brought here and stationed and be used only for drill purposes. Word received by the Sons of Veterans is to the effect that the Boston is in such shape that the government will not let her go to sea. It had been planned to sell the ship in San Francisco but these plans were changed when the condition of the vessel became known. The Sons of Veterans are figuring on another boat.

Progress Club Takes Up Work—Will Find Out Needy Cases and Enlist Aid of State Society

Acting in response to a letter from the Red Cross society for the prevention of tuberculosis, the Progress club yesterday started a move that will result in a tubercular survey of the county. The idea is to find out the whereabouts of needy sufferers. These names are to be sent to the headquarters of the society and an effort will be made to supply medical aid for the sufferers and, where necessary, to take them to a sanitarium.

Each case will be dealt with separately. In two weeks the survey will probably be completed. Each member is to do investigation. Red Cross stamps are sold here every year for the state tuberculosis fighting and prevention fund.

**BUILD BARGES**  
 KRUSE AND BANKS GET ORDER FROM DUPONT POWDER CO.

Big Contracts for San Francisco to Be Completed in About Sixty Days—Employ Big Force

It is announced that the Kruse and Banks shipyards at North Bend has been awarded the contract for the construction of two large hopper barges by the DuPont Powder company. The barges are for use on San Francisco Bay and are to be delivered in about sixty days.

This additional order on top of the contracts for two large vessels which the firm secured a short time ago will keep them very busy.

They now have about sixty employed in the shipyards and this force will be increased to upwards of one hundred men within a few weeks.

**SHIPCARPENTERS SCARCE**

Now comes the announcement of E. H. Meir, local agent of the McCormack Steamship company's interests in Portland, to the effect that the St. Helens Shipbuilding Company has turned down a contract for the building of a large steam schooner because shipcarpenters cannot be obtained.

These workmen are at a premium. Shipyards of the Pacific are filled with orders. The St. Helens company has four steam schooners now on the ways and one of them, the Port of Portland, will be launched in March.

It was while this was being done that Herron struck a match in the darkness and the explosion was the result. Larson was brought with all haste to the city where Dr. Horsfall attended him.
