

WILL GET TROUT

R. E. CLANTON, SUPT. OF HATCHERIES, WRITES JOHN D. GOSS

No Need of Ten Mile Hatchery—Raise Fish on South Coos River—To Send Fry in Here

Trout will be available for planting in Ten Mile lake this year, according to a letter received by John D. Goss from R. E. Clanton, Superintendent of Hatcheries. A query was sent him asking that Black Spotted and Cutthroat Trout fry be sent here this spring. It was pointed out that the lake is urgently in need of restocking.

At the Coos River Hatchery there are already some 300,000 eggs of the Eastern Brook trout, says the letter. Mr. Clanton says there will be sent, in addition to these, a good number of Rainbow eggs, all of which will be hatched at the hatchery up Coos River. This obviates the need of getting money for putting up a building for this purpose at Ten Mile lake.

"And when the same are ready for planting," Mr. Clanton states, "Frank Smith will be instructed to consult with the sportsmen and place the fish where they are wanted."

Also he is writing to Scammon Brothers at Ten Mile, offering to buy any eggs that they will sell and these, too, would be sent up the river, for keeping until they are ready to be turned loose.

But it does not seem possible at this time to get hold of the Black Spotted or the Cutthroat trout.

Will Aid Coos.

In conclusion the letter says: "You may rest assured that the State Board of Fish and Game Commission desires to do everything possible to see that the streams of your country are stocked with fish as they fully realize that when transportation becomes easier that fishing will be carried on more extensively by sportsmen from outside points."

Mr. Goss, as chairman of the Fish and Game Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, wrote to Mr. Clanton early in the month asking for state aid in getting fish for liberating this spring in Ten Mile.

ROAD MEN TO MEET

CURRY COUNTY COURT INVITED HERE TO CONFERENCE

Deputy State Highway Engineer Cantine Inspects Roads—To Make All Year Highway to Sunset Bay

The state stands ready at all times to cooperate with the county authorities in road building matters, according to the statement last evening of E. I. Cantine, deputy State Highway Engineer. He arrived here late yesterday with R. B. Murdock, county roadmaster, the two men having come over the road from Coquille on horseback. Today they went down to Sunset Bay in a buggy.

Survey the County Roads. A survey of every road in the county being made by the two road men. "If you are going to improve them," said Mr. Cantine last evening, "you might as well improve them along with a system that will fit in with the state program for trunk roads."

He is acting here in an advisory matter with Roadmaster Murdock. He says that in Coos he has found stretches of road that are as good as some of the best in the state.

"But while you are most interested right now in the matter of county roads," continued the engineer, "by no means forget about the coast road, an all the year highway to connect with the one now building up the coast from California."

To Hold Road Conference

A general road conference is to be held here the latter part of next week. An invitation has been forwarded to the Curry county court to be present. The vice president of the Coos Good Roads Association will also be here and, together with Mr. Cantine, they will go over the road program for the year. The proposed bond issue will be taken up at the same time.

Mr. Cantine continued on the subject of the coast road. "Down in Curry they do not realize what this highway would mean to them. They have only the one main road. Curry has an assessed valuation of \$4,000,000. A road tax there would do as much good as any that might be raised in Coos where there are more roads to be attended to."

Oregon's Time is Now

He said California is to vote on another \$18,000,000 bond issue to continue the coast road. The highway is a permanent one. Right now, he believes is Oregon's time to take up the matter.

Today the party went to Sunset Bay in a buggy, looking over the road situation. They will be back here this evening.

Bids were to have been advertised for today for planking the road between North Bend and Empire over the new road. Planking is now being laid lengthwise from South Inlet to Sunset Bay, thus making an all year road.

Have an All Year Road

Roadmaster Murdock says that with the planking laid as far as Empire and the road between there and South Inlet kept in good condition that it will be possible to run vehicles over those highways any time of the year.

Glen Rozelle has been appointed foreman of the district from South Inlet to Sunset Bay and will work continuously on the roads.

Owners of vehicles from all over the county are responding with the road census blanks filled out, said Mr. Murdock. He emphasizes the fact that these are also meant for autolists. There was a misunderstanding in this regard.

ENGINEERS VISIT

W. R. FONTAINE AND C. H. BEATTIE INSPECT RAILROAD

Sluslaw Bridge Works Perfectly—Train Service Will Include Express, Mail, Parcels Post Service

The gods of good luck were with the Willamette Pacific engineers at the time the floods came on the Sluslaw. The very day the big bridge was completed and the draw span put to swinging, orders were given to tear away the false work and that night the floods descended. Had the false work still been in place it is probable that the big bridge would have been seriously damaged by the logs and debris that came down a short time after this.

W. R. Fontaine and C. H. Beattie, assistant engineers, came in last night from Eugene, inspecting the line and this morning returned again over the same route.

The Sluslaw bridge is working exactly as it was expected to, said Mr. Fontaine and work trains are running over it every day.

In 10 days he expects the last of the piling will have been done on Lake Tahkenitch and it will take only four days more to have the rails actually laid down to the Umpqua, thus completing steel connection between Coos Bay and the outside world.

The bridge at the Umpqua cannot be finished in months. However, as soon as passenger service is opened up to the Willamette Valley boats will be used in ferrying across the river.

No freight can be handled yet for several months is the announcement but the baggage, the parcels post and the express will come in over this route and the railroad officials are now figuring on the proposition of carrying the mails through this way.

Following the laying of the rails there will still be considerable halting that must be done, said the engineers.
