**BROWN SELLS OUT**

**EXPECTS TO TAKE OVER OWNERSHIP OF RED CROSS**

R. W. Swanton to Continue With Present Store on Market Avenue Both Experienced Druggists

J. Lee Brown, for ten years connected with the Brown Drug Company, has sold out his interests in that concern and tomorrow will in all probability, take over the ownership of the Red Cross Drug Co. It is now ten years since Mr. Brown, who is now secretary of the Oregon Pharmaceutical Board, started in the drug business on North Front street. Three years later Robert W. Swanton bought into the concern and it became known as the Brown Drug Company. Mr. Swanton will continue the business on Market avenue under his own proprietorship.

The Pruess Drug Company, known also as the Red Cross, was formed more than 29 years ago by John Pruess. For about 13 years Frank Birch has been connected with the company. He will continue his optical business without any change whatsoever. Mr. Brown is now negotiating with the trustees of the Red Cross Drug Company and expects to soon complete the deal.

**MAY DITCH MOTOR**

**SUPT. MILLER ASKS FOR STANDARD ENGINE AND COACHES**

Says Motor Unable to Handle Baggage and Passengers Too—Expect Definite Word Shortly

No word as yet has been received by Supt. W. F. Miller, as to when service will be opened to Reedsport, now that the hourly service to North Bend has been suspended, through action of the council last evening.

Word of this action has been sent to Portland and it may be several days before definite action is taken.

With rails reaching the Umpqua from the north by Saturday Mr. Miller is hoping that at least three standard coaches may be brought to Coos Bay to replace the veterans that are now on the run to the Coquille Valley and Powers.

**Send in New Coaches**

This matter was taken up with William Hood, chief engineer, when he was here said Mr. Miller. These coaches would be 60 or 75 feet in length, 10 feet anyhow longer than the present cars. Also a locomotive is necessary on this side.

If the construction department of the Southern Pacific can be brought to see the matter in the right light this new equipment will be brought at once to Coos Bay.

**Steam Train to Umpqua**

Such action as this would in all probability mean that a steam train instead of the motor car would be run to the Umpqua, said Mr. Miller. The motor would be unable to handle the baggage, the parcel post and the express that will be coming through. In this event, he says, he does not know where the motor car will be used.

"Possibly to Coquille and to Powers?" is the query.

"I hear there are your auto stage lines getting ready to do business," he replied. "You can see where we get off then."

Strictly speaking 30 days should elapse from the suspending the ordinance section before the motor car is taken from the hourly run to North Bend. These 30 days are allowed for the invoking of a referendum.

**May Go Ahead Anyway**

C. F. McKnight, attorney for the company, said this morning that the Southern Pacific may go ahead anyway and put on the service to the Umpqua within a very short time.

The regular service out of Eugene is expected to open between April 1 and 15. Two trains would be needed on the line as a transfer would have to be made across the Umpqua.

**BREAKWATER BACK**

**TO BE HERE SUNDAY FROM SOUTH ON NEW RUN**

**To Alternate With Kilburn on Schedule From Portland to San Diego and Way Points**

The steamship Breakwater will return to Coos Bay on Sunday, leaving San Francisco on Friday at the starting of a new service of the North Pacific Company. Hereafter the Kilburn and the Breakwater will be on the run from Portland to Coos Bay, Eureka, San Francisco, Santa Barbara, San Pedro and San Diego. The steamship Roanoke will make all these stops with the exception of Coos Bay and Eureka.

Installation of the new service will mean a steamship into Coos Bay every five and ten days. For instance the Kilburn is due here tomorrow morning from Portland. On her new schedule it will be ten days before she returns here from the south. The five days end of the schedule will be between Coos Bay and Portland and return.

Word of the new change was received late today at the offices of the North Pacific Steamship Company by Agent L. G. Cushing.
