Chamber of Commerce Meets.—Tonight is the time for the regular monthly meeting of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce. The committee that have been serving since the first of the year are expected to make their reports, among them being the committee on membership. All members are expected to be present.

Camp Closed Down.—McDonald and Vaughn's camp at Sumner is closed down today. Last evening just before quitting time an injector on one of the pumps that supplies the three logging engines broke, and it was impossible to get any water to them. If this had not occurred it is believed that the snow of today would have killed the work.

Is Back in Portland.—Tom Richardson, always a strong booster for Oregon and well known here as one of the organizers of the Chamber of Commerce, has returned to the Rose City from Texas where he has been for more than a year and it is said that he may again associate himself with the Portland Chamber of Commerce.

Inspects Offices.—Postoffice Inspector Gallagher spent yesterday at Coosston and is here today. Before returning to Spokane he will have paid a visit to every postoffice in this section. He said that his trip in here is only in connection with the usual inspection visits and has nothing to do regarding new mail routings.

To Finish Line.—To bridge one of the last gaps in the all the way wire connection over the Willamette Pacific to Eugene, a crew of wiremen arrived last evening from Gardiner. Today they are busy stringing the wires for the Western Union company between Marshfield and North Bend. The work is in charge of J. B. Buis. The other linemen who arrived last evening from Gardiner are, A. F. Green, A. W. Miller, C. R. Johnson, Frank Harris, James Barry, Lee Whitel, O. H. McCormick, George Salmon and J. E. Churchhill. It is expected that the entire line will be in operation by March 10.

O'Connell Loses.—Eddie O'Connell, instructor in wrestling at the Multnomah Athletic club, is well known in Coos and Curry counties for the matches in which he has been interested. In Portland the other night he was downed in two straight falls, the first time he has been to the mat in several years. The first match went to him in one hour and eight minutes and the second in 24 minutes, 28 seconds. O'Connell did considerable wrestling last year at the Port Orford agate carnival.
