COOS RIVER HIGH SCHOOL NEWS

There are sixty-nine pupils in the Coos River school at the present. Our school has decreased about nineteen per cent, mainly due to the sickness that has been passing around, which has delayed some from school for awhile. Others have moved away, which also helps to add to the decreasing process.

The physical geography class of the Coos River high school are learning how sediment is carried and dropped by the water. They have made small streams in dirt at their laboratory work, which shows where and how sandbars are formed and where the deepest water is.

The Coos River high school boys have been working on the baseball diamond. They have it in fairly good shape, but bad weather interferes with their efforts.
The botany class have pressed and dried Johnny-jump-ups, violets, pussy-willows, and lilies and bound them on drawing paper. They have a flower garden on the river bank, consisting of sweet peas, nasturtiums, and dabbies. In the text book they are studying the structure of stems.

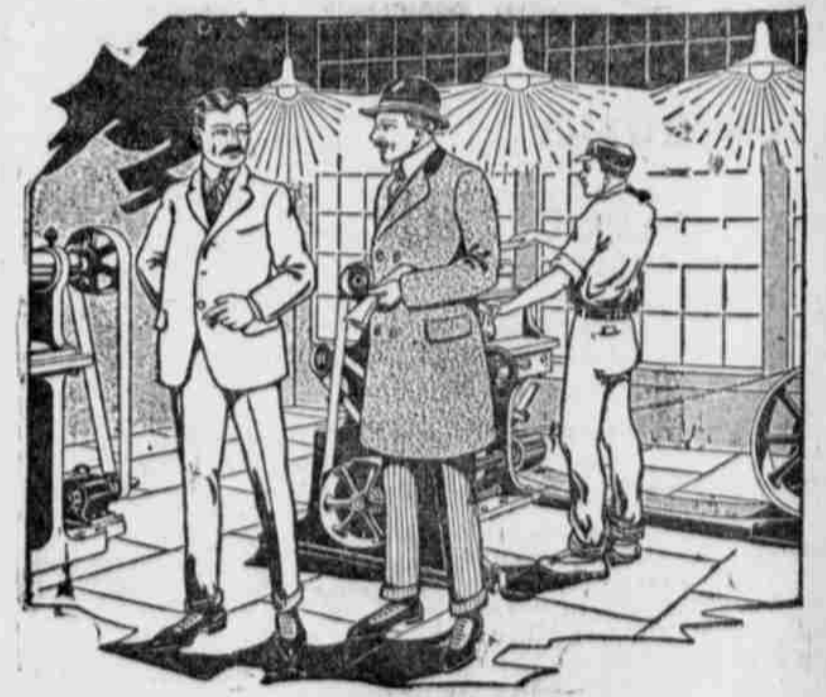
