In speaking of the main trunk road Mr. Cantine said that he took into consideration the country that it opened to easy markets and also the part it would play in the scheme for a coast road up from California.

MAKING SOUNDINGS

ENGINEERS TAKING SURVEY OF THE COOS BAY BAR

Now Platting Blue Print of Siuslaw Depths—Superintendent of the Jetty Work is Here.

Soundings of the Coos Bay bar were commenced yesterday, when Port Engineer Donald Charleson and Verla Parker went out in the gasoline schooner Tramp. They hoisted their lead about the South Spit and expected today to be working in the main channel.

It is several months now since a sounding was taken on the Coos Bay bar and there is considerable interest as to whether or not the channel has been filling up through the winter months. The dredge Michie is expected back for work again by April 1.

Parker has just returned from the Siuslaw where he was aiding in the making of a survey. No definite figures are yet given out, though it is expected that the soundings are about the same as those taken last June, showing between 16 and 18 feet as the depth at high tide.

Superintendent is Here.

E. A. de Schweinitz, superintendent of the jetty work at the Siuslaw, was here today on business. The work there has been delayed somewhat on account of the weather, it being possible to work only one crew of men.

As soon as the weather moderates, it is the intention to put on a second crew and to open another quarry. It is expected this work on the Siuslaw will not be finished for considerably more than a year yet.

RUSE BY GERMANS

Equip Mines With Periscopes to Destroy Ships to Destruction

Lure Enemy Vessels to Ram Mines for Submarines by Imitation—Mine Sweepers Get Busy

BALTIMORE, March 6.—Floating mines, equipped with periscopes, are said to be the latest means now being used by the Germans in bringing about the destruction of enemy ships according to Captain B. J. Keely, of the British steamship Hartfield. The Hartfield arrived here Sunday from London.

Captain Keely tells of having sighted one of the new destructive agents in the English Channel. The periscope gave it the appearance of a submarine. He did not attempt to win the Admiralty's reward of \$2500 for ramming a submarine, but reported to a patrol boat.

According to masters of British vessels, the placing of a periscope on a mine was devised for the express purpose of inducing some of the ships of the allied nations to ram, which would have resulted in the blowing up of the ship and possibly the loss of life. It is understood that a number of the periscoped mines have been cast around Britain and the fleet of patrol boats are engaged in removing them from the track of navigation.

BIG CAR STRIKE

EMPLOYEES WALKOUT IN DEMAND FOR 30 CENTS PER HOUR

Only About One-fourth of Cars Running—First Transportation Trouble Capital Has Had

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 6.—A street car strike called by the men yesterday is still in progress today, although the two companies made every effort to furnish service and about 25 per cent of the cars are in operation.

The Capital has never had a transportation strike before. The strikers demand a minimum wage of 30 cents an hour with ten hours work within twelve consecutive hours.

CHIEF CARTER INTERRUPTS SUBURBAN BATTLE YESTERDAY

Phillip Emery, arrested yesterday in—Opponent Gets Away and Name is Not Known

Phillip Emery, arrested yesterday on a charge of fighting, pleaded guilty this afternoon before Judge Butler in the police court and was fined \$5. A John Doe warrant is out for the arrest of his opponent, whose name is not known.

The knuckles of one of Emery's hands were swollen, one arm was black and blue and an eye also had traces of a severe battle waged.

Chief Carter received word yesterday that the men were fighting on Kruse avenue. He hurried there in a car with Arthur McKeown, just in time to see Fred Bentz crank the car and hurry away with the spectators.

Race in Machine's

Then followed a wild race of the autos. Emery's car, Marshal Carter says, ran 35 miles an hour out the roadway while he and Arthur McKeown followed at a 32-mile clip in the J. W. Bennett auto which had been requisitioned by Chief Carter as the police patrol in the emergency. They finally forced the Emery auto to stop.

He arrested Emery, but found that his opponent had walked in another direction away from the scene of action. The men thought they were fighting outside the city limits. Emery, who is a chauffeur, claimed the quarrel was over a bill for auto hire and that the man refused to pay it and also struck at him. It was then they got in the car and went out to settle their differences.

Carter threatened that unless Emery divulged the name of his opponent he would file a charge of speeding against him.

NEED BIGGER ARMY

FORMER MEMBER OF NAVAL BOARD TELLS DANGERS

Monroe Doctrine and Asiatic Exclusion Two Principal Reasons for Greater Preparedness

ST. LOUIS, Mar. 6.—The Monroe doctrine and Asiatic exclusion are cited as reasons for a strong navy by Henry Wisewood, former member of the navy consulting board, in addressing a conference of mayors, on national defense.

"The Monroe doctrine conflicts with the colonial policy of the German empire and the Asiatic exclusion policy conflicts with the national policy of Japan. Were Germany to feint toward South America, the remainder could convey eight hundred thousand troops which the general staff stated can be landed in forty-six days."

A letter from Samuel Gompers protested against the use of organized militia to break strikes.

U S CONSULATE HIT

Persian Killed Within Twenty Feet of His Desk—Vice Consul's Residence Also Struck

WASHINGTON, D. C., Mar. 6.—The American Consulate at Trebizond, the Turkish port on the Black Sea, was struck by a shell during the bombardment by two Russian torpedo boats March 1 and a Persian subject was killed within 20 feet of the desk of Consul Oscar S. Heizer. Another shell struck the residence of the Vice Consul adjoining.

SENATOR CHAMBERLAIN INTRODUCES MEASURE.

Provides For Standing Army of 178,000, With 217,000 National Guards—Other Preparedness.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—The senate army bill introduced by Chairman Chamberlain, of the military affairs committee, which proposes the most thorough measures in military preparedness ever presented to congress in peace times, is the first of the national defense bills urged by the president to be introduced.

The senate army bill proposes an increase in the peace strength of the regular army to 178,000, to federalize the national guard peace strength of 217,000, create a federal volunteer army, and provide reserves.

View of Chamberlain. "It is the most comprehensive measure in the way of preparedness ever presented to congress," said Senator Chamberlain. "The essential features comprise a sufficient increase in the regular army to enable a mobile force to be organized in divisions and brigades and to provide sufficient corps of coast artillery to man the existing and approved new batteries. The new mobile army comprises sixty-four regiments of infantry organized in seven divisions, twenty-five regiments of cavalry organized in two divisions with the remaining regiments of field artillery and seven regiments of engineers. This gives proper garrisons to Panama, Hawaii and the Philippines, with four infantry and two cavalry divisions left in the United States.
