ALREADY APPRAISING PROPERTY OF COOS FOR 1916

"No Reduction" Says T. J. Thrift, County Assessor—Autoists Kick About High Valuation

Making up of the 1916 assessment rolls has started. T. J. Thrift, county assessor, was here this morning to get the work about Coos Bay well under way.

He said that in all probability the assessments for the new year will be about the same as those for 1915, but he was confident of the fact there will not be a general reduction.

C. J. Furlow will be a deputy for the north end of Coos county; C. H. Dungan for Sumner and Coos River; A. E. Morton, North Bend; G. N. Bolt, Marshfield; I. M. Weekly, the upper Coquille; Frank Burkholder, north of Bandon and along the Coquille between Myrtle Point and Bandon; T. J. Thrift, for Bandon, Coquille, Myrtle Point and Marshfield. Mr. Thrift is now considering the appointment of C. A. Pennock as deputy assessor for Eastside.

Autoists this morning were complaining of the high valuation being placed on the cars. The general schedule of valuation is based on the age of the car and the factory price of it. The schedule is as follows: 1916 cars at 60 per cent. 1915 cars at 50 per cent. 1914 cars at 40 per cent. 1913 cars at 30 per cent. 1912 cars at 20 per cent. Others Not Assessed

The cars made before 1912 are not rated as being worth assessing. Edgar McDaniel was the first car owner in North Bend to be assessed, the valuation of \$229 being placed on his 1914 Ford although he insisted he would sell the machine outright for that price. This would make his taxes about \$13 on the machine.
