Coke Is Affirmed.—Word has been received here of the affirmation of Judge Coke's decision for the plaintiffs in the case of Minnie Stadleman et al. versus W. H. Miner et al. a suit to quiet title to land, that was taken to the Supreme court on an appeal. The land involved was Ten Mile property said to be worth about \$16,000. The case has been long in the courts.

Port to Meet.—The regular monthly meeting of the Port of Coos Bay Commission will be held on Monday at the Chamber of Commerce. At this time it is expected the Port will take up the matter of the pending lawsuit against the Port and the city jointly, by West Marshfield land owners, who claim \$36,000 damages for the flooding of their lands.

Boat Is Not Sold.—Contrary to the report of yesterday that the gasoline boat Marshfield has been sold, comes the statement today of Harry J. Kimball, executor of the J. A. O'Kelley estate, that the sale has been refused. Sandine Bros., of Kentuck Inlet, are said to have looked the craft over, but balked on the price of \$600. The craft has been on the Isthmus Inlet run by Len Miller but is now doing charter work. It formerly belonged to the late J. A. O'Kelley, who conducted a passenger service between Marshfield and North Bend before the advent of the Jitneys.
