SPEAKS AT NORTH BEND

Dr. E. S. Conklin of Oregon University spoke at a public meeting in North Bend last Tuesday evening, under the auspices of the Mothers and Teachers Club, to a large and appreciative audience.

Most interesting was the talk given by Dr. E. S. Conklin on "Psychology of the Crowd." He showed the spirit of mob rule, the blending of all individual mind to "follow the leader," a fact that accounts for lynchings, for the "going wild" of a political crowd, people as a mass doing things which as individuals they never would have done. During such times, he said, one entirely loses his personality and becomes a unit in a group which has but one mind, a very dangerous proceeding if headed by erratic leaders. The talk was given in such a clear and simple way that even a child could understand. The speaker was introduced by Mrs. George Watkins, president of the North Bend Mothers and Teachers Club.

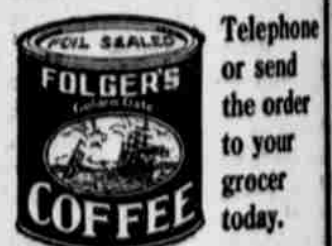

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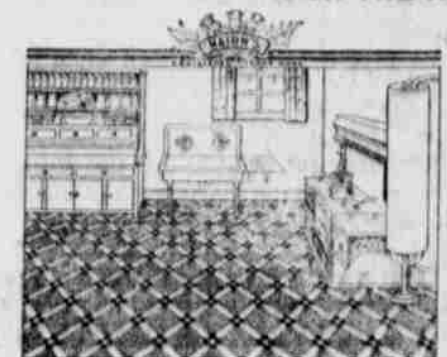


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
