The A. N. Pupils of the Seventh grade, High School, are studying notes and negotiable paper. They will supplement their class room work with visits to the banks.

Commercial students have planned the following extra class room work for the rest of the year: A visit to the office of the Oregon Power Company, to the office of the Title, Guarantee and Abstract Co., and two talks on business by local business men, to be given at the school.

By a system of inter-teacher checking up, students in High School are graded on their ability in composition in any and all subjects and not on the so-called "composition" alone.

Pupils of the Fourth Grade Central gave an exhibition of reading on Tuesday, to a few mothers.

Pupils in the Fifth grade of the High School will give an exhibition of reading this week, on Tuesday.

On a seven minute multiplication test in 3A High School there were four perfects and 12 with slight errors, sixteen came within the time limit. There were two failures.

The spring vacation of one week will take place the last week in March.

Delay in getting the lock box is holding back the school banking system. It will be started right soon now.

## WORK HAS REWARD

BEAUTIFUL GARDEN AT DEUBNER HOME A MASS OF COLOR.

Mrs. W. C. Deubner Started First Flower Garden in Marshfield—Flowers Grow in Profusion.

Mrs. W. C. Deubner is the fairy godmother of flower gardens in Marshfield. She had the very first one in this city, away back in 1873 when, as she says, "people laughed at the idea and thought I was crazy; said it wasn't worth the work." But Mrs. Deubner refused to be laughed down by such "silly opinions," and she kept up her work. Mr. W. S. Deubner believed exactly as did his wife and today they view with much satisfaction the immense and most beautiful garden that surrounds their home at 272 Park avenue.

### Last Word in Gardening.

For one in search of ideas on how to cultivate a garden and what to grow in it, no better suggestion can be made than that they take a walk to the Deubner home and see what two lovers of flowers have accomplished.

Quite naturally, one of the first questions about their place is, "What have they in the garden?" Perhaps the closest answer to this could be obtained by naming the lists out of a seed catalogue; the Deubner garden seems to have everything included and then a few more extras for the sake of good measure.

### Is a Mass of Colors.

Despite the bad weather of the past month, a glimpse at the home at this time discloses a mass of color. The front walk leading to the house is lined on either side with narcissus, daffodils, tulips, rose bushes, pinks, crocus, primrose—in fact an innumerable list of plants, for they have not all been named. Great rose bushes climb on special frames to the second story of the house in front and the trimming of them is the special right of the lady of the house though Mr. Deubner has won his laurels in the neat manner in which he keeps the ivy trimmed that clutters the east fence.

### Backyard Spick and Span.

Both sides of the house are strips of lawn, well kept grass with weeds reduced to a minimum and there is more lawn in the back yard. In fact the big question propounded by the owners of this lovely place was, "Well, why shouldn't the back doorway be as clean as the front?"

It is. There is not the least doubt about it. All the way from the front gate to the back fence, easily a distance of 200 feet, at a guess, not a single blade of grass seems out of place and not a single square foot of ground has gone to waste. Every bit not covered by grass or taken up in walks and buildings is furnishing nourishment to dozens of kinds of flowers.

### Arbor Is Unique.

The long arbor at the rear is covered with clematis and trailing rosebushes. There are half a dozen other sorts of vines here and there in the yard.

### Raise Vegetables, Too.

The vegetable garden is every bit as well tilled as the remainder of the yard and the owners declare it is no little satisfaction to have all the vegetables they want, and off their own ground. There are plenty of berry bushes and many sorts of fruit trees.

This, in brief, is the Deubner home, one of the finest examples in all Marshfield of a garden beautiful. There can be no better suggestion than to go and see what has been accomplished there and then to go home, firmly resolved to put in those rosebushes and tidy up a bit.
