**Ferry Traffic.**—Capt. Alex Hall of the Ferry Transit reports that during February he carried 4756 passengers, 57 double teams, 150 single rigs, 201 autos and 42 head of stock between Marshfield and Eastvile.

**Was Injured.**—Word has been received here that Ed Hansen, brother of Jens Hansen and well known on Coos Bay, was recently quite badly hurt on the San Gabriel, on which he is now engineer. No bones were broken but he was badly bruised. For years Mr. Hansen was engineer on the tug Cleamer.

**Jinkson Wins Suit.**—The jury in the justice court last evening returned a verdict for H. Jinkson, plaintiff in the case of Jinkson vs. P. E. Hague, a suit to collect \$47.45 due for wood delivered to the defendant. Mr. Hague argued that the wood was bought by the Pioneer Hardware Company and that Jinkson had a bill at the store which the wood was supposed to offset.

**To Aid the Wounded.**—Several persons in Marshfield have received of late chain letters, asking a contribution of 10 cents and that three more letters be written to friends, all asking for 10 cents. The chain is expected ultimately to turn about \$50,000 into the Red Cross Fund, half of which will go toward the

founding of a hospital for wounded British soldiers at Netley, England, and the remainder goes into the Prince of Wales hospital fund. It is said that many of these chain letters have been started in the United States for the wounded of the Allies.

**Suit Up Tomorrow.**—The suit of William Shook versus Robert M. Kyle will come up tomorrow morning in Judge Pennock's court. Shook seeks to recover \$124.90, claiming that he exchanged his rooming house on Second street, known as the Johnson Rooming house, to Kyle for a house and lot near the high school and was to have received \$75 in addition. Also he alleges that he paid \$29.99 for two water tanks that some one else claims and he asks \$29 paid out for wood. Kyle has come back with a counter claim for \$43.70, claiming that Shook took personal property from the home near the high school.
