GLENS FALLS, N. Y., March 16.—If I had my way I would not try to bring Villa under the protection of the United States, but would turn him over to Carranza, who knows how to deal with him," declared former President Taft at the first annual dinner of the Glens Falls chamber of commerce.

He stated that if the United States could capture Villa and "draw his fangs out" it would remove the chief cause of the Mexican difficulties and assure peace in that country. Mr. Taft closed his talk with a plea for preparedness and urged the building of a large navy.
