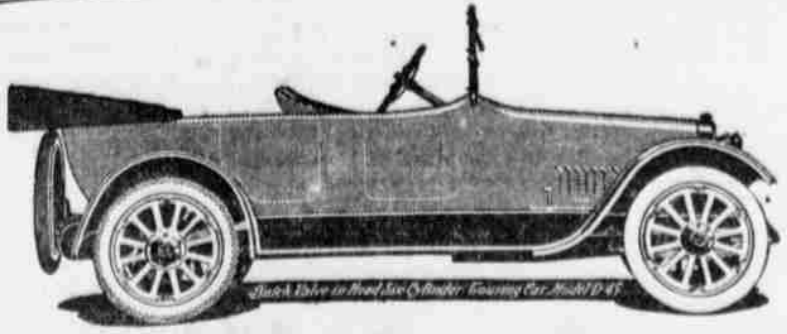

He asks that the Chamber of Commerce appoint a committee to work in the interests of the Chautauqua, saying that advertising matter will be forwarded very shortly.

**Special Night School Service.**—On Sunday at 11 a. m. there will be a special service in the interests of the students of the high school, to which the Faculty and teachers of the graded schools are also invited as participants in the corporate service. "Educating for Service" will be the theme for the address on this occasion, and special music will be sung by the choir.
